Germany Starving On Food Substitutes

**Government Roundly Denounced By
Berlin University Professor For
Permitting Different Excuses
For Food to Appear on
the Market**

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 15.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The almost complete lack of nourishment in many of the food "substitutes" now being sold in Germany is arousing a storm of warning from German scientists, who declare that government supervision of the whole substitute food traffic is an immediate necessity. Professor Jucknack of the University of Berlin, writing in the Vossische Zeitung, says:

"It is useless any longer to hide the truth. Unless the government intervenes to put some control over the food of substitute foods with which we are overwhelmed, the end of the war will also see the end of a third of Germany's population. Moreover, the remaining two-thirds will be so enfeebled from malnutrition that they will be unable to perform the im-

mense tasks of recuperation and restoration.

"The devil alone knows what are the ingredients of thousands of these wretched substitutes that already do duty for butter and eggs, oil and milk, flour and aprites, meat and broth, coffee and sugar, tobacco and tea, fish and sausage, cheese and caviar, and so on, without end.

"The latest products of the ingenious substitute mongers are really too terrible to be tolerated. A preparation of crude kerosene is now being largely sold as frying oil, and 800 cases of serious illness, together with nine deaths, have been traced to its use in Berlin alone. A preparation called "goose droppings" is prepared from dog's fat; egg substitute form a mixture of chalk and baking powder; caviar from fish scales, and bread from straw. What people, no matter how patriotic, can hold out on such fare?"

ITALIANS SUCCESSFUL WEDNESDAY

POSITION OF LINES ON NORTH-
ERN FRONT IMPROVED BY AC-
TIVITIES OF WEDNESDAY—BER-
LIN ALSO CLAIMS VICTORY

ROME, Feb. 1.—The Italians now position west of the Frontale Valley on the mountain front was improved Wednesday, the war office has announced. The line was advanced slightly to the northwest of Col del Rosso.

BERLIN, Feb. 1.—Italian attacks launched Wednesday southwest of Asiago plateau broke down under the Teuton fire, according to official reports. The Italian prisoners have been increased to over 600.

Compulsory Food Legislation Wanted

WASHINGTON, D. C., The burden of food saving must be placed on the luxurious and greedy, and not upon the poor.

This must be the basis of absolutely necessary new conservation and food saving legislation.

Herbert C. Hoover has announced this as his position in a letter written to Representative Sydney Anderson of Minnesota, who had proposed new food legislation. The Anderson proposal of legislation, Mr. Hoover says, does not go far enough. The legislation that is to come thru the extension of the Lever act, Mr. Hoover said, must include:

Control of distribution, in order that all classes and localities shall fare alike, and that unnecessary consumption shall be prevented.

Control of use of foodstuffs in food. Measure with a view to limiting the essential manufactures.

Control of commodities critically necessary for the production and preservation of food stuffs in order to prevent great losses or military sacrifices.

In addition, Mr. Hoover indorses the following sections of the Anderson bill:

Compulsory wheatless or other-less days weekly.

Prohibiting use of food stuffs in non-food products.

Limitation of food served in public eating places.

Declaring that 30 per cent of all food is wasted, Mr. Hoover said that conservation measures "must not draw savings from that class to which economy and moderate use is a daily necessity."

The shortage in sugar will not exceed 10 per cent next year. That should be made up, Mr. Hoover said, thru reduction of candy and sweet drinks manufactures by at least 20 per cent. Sugar distribution also

must be controlled, he said, to keep it from "greedy hands."

Ammonia also must be reduced. There is today an absolute shortage of \$50,000,000 pounds of this product in sight. To meet this shortage, Mr. Hoover recommended that use of ammonia be prohibited for maintenance of skating rinks, fur and alcoholic drinks, cold storage establishments and household ammonia, and the like. Unless the ammonia shortage is met, he said, the danger to the military establishment will be great, as the production of munitions must be reduced.

Wastage of time for cans also must be prohibited, he urged. In conclusion Hoover said:

"I am perfectly willing to go on and make every effort to succeed with voluntary methods, and, in fact, the situation is one of such gravity that we are now sending out further and further requests for more self denial, for more voluntary action among the trades in support of conservation. I hope that we will succeed, but I think it only right to point out that, if it shall fail, the grave responsibility can not be left upon my shoulders, if congress should consider that nothing further is necessary by way of legislation."

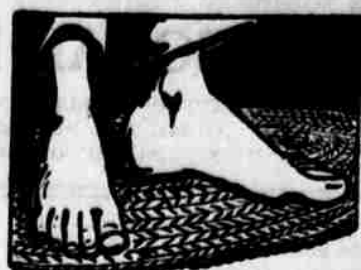
