Ford Making New

Submarine Killer

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 2.—A new "submarine killer" has been developed by the navy department. Secretary of the Navy Daniels has informed the house naval affairs committee.

Contracts for a great number of the new style of ship have been given to Henry Ford. The vessel is a fabricated ship 300 feet long, equipped with all the latest appliances for submarine warfare. Work has already begun at the Ford plant on the parts of the new vessel. Naval constructors have just returned to Washington from Detroit. Secretary Daniels told the committee, and are "greatly pleased" with the progress that has already been made.

The parts for the new vessel will be made in Detroit, but the vessels themselves will be put together at the east shore.

"The new boat will be not unlike our old destroyers," Secretary Daniels said, "but it will have many features that will make it by far the most efficient vessel of any navy now engaged in the war on submarines. The admiralities of other nations have looked over plans and approved them. Some of them probably will let contracts for similar vessels."

The new vessel can be turned out very rapidly. Secretary Daniels said, and in great numbers. Some vessels of this type flying the American flag will be in the European war zone "within a very few months."

RUSSIA POINTS THE WAY TO A LARGER FREEDOM

Here he is!

Colonel William B. Thompson, of the numerous connections indicated above, returned to the United States recently from Russia, where, as head of the American Red Cross Mission, he spent four months trying to be of service to the Russian people. A very successful figure in Wall street, he learned much about the rights of man and the instincts of democracy, and on his return to his native country he said, in the course of an interview:

"Russia is not anarchistic. Russia is not lawless. The despised Bolsheviki are not and never have been pro-German, and the attitude of the American press in failing to understand them has tended to aid the Kaiser's cause. The fact is that Russia has been under the leadership for several months of the most radical socialist group, but this fact is neither unnatural nor a thing to provoke despair. It simply means that Russia is pointing the way toward a new order of society throughout the world—a larger freedom, a more complete equality and what I believe to be a purer democracy than the world has ever known before. The Russian people have made tremendous sacrifices for this ideal, but they have been happy in their suffering and would not exchange their new-found freedom for the condition that obtain anywhere else on earth."

"I sincerely believe that Russia is pointing the way to a general peace, just as she is pointing the way to great and sweeping world changes. It is not in Russia alone that the old order is passing. There is a lot of the old order in America, and that is going to go. We might just as well open our eyes to it all of us. The time has come everywhere when affairs must be handled for the benefit of the many—never again for the comparatively few, and what I call legislation by proxy must cease."

"I am glad it is so. When I sat and watched these democratic convictions in Russia I felt that I would welcome a similar scene in the United States. Some cultured professor or some great captain of industry now in Congress might be answered by some locomotive fireman in Kansas, and often Bolsheviki would have a shade the sense of the story. It'd like to see a lot of workmen in the United States—some not merely attorneys for workmen, but men whose rough hands or rough and ready

ways show that they are actually doing the world's work. Then I'd like to see real employers side by side with them instead of their paid attorneys. I believe we'd all come to a better understanding then."

"President Wilson has shown that he appreciates the full situation. His message to Congress is one upon which the common people of all nations can come to a common understanding. It should be received by the workers of Germany with the same enthusiasm that it was received in Petrograd and it is not beyond my expectations that it may prove a death blow to German imperialism."

"Shortly after his return home from Russia Colonel Thompson was given a dinner by the Rocky Mountain Club, of which he has for many years been vice president. The menu was submitted in advance to Herbert Hoover, Food Administrator, who approved it and wrote as follows:

"I am very glad to say to the Rocky Mountain Club, and through that unique organization to all my Western friends, that they can get up just as good dinners as they ever served and still keep within the lines of food conservation which the exigency of war makes necessary to lay down."

"I congratulate the Rocky Mountain Club upon its hearty co-operation in setting a good example, and for the work of the Food Administration the same splendid support that has been so characteristic of engineers and Westerners throughout this war."

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
