Trial of Bolo Pasha Was Begun Yesterday

Sensational Developments Are Expected at This Hearing in France in Which Several Former Officials of High Rank Are Said to Be Implicated

PARIS, Feb. 5.—In bringing to trial Paul Bolo, or Bolo Pasha, the French government is endeavoring to disrupt the whole system of German intrigue and propaganda in France, which in the spring of 1917 became so bold and effective as to threaten to defeat France's efforts to carry on the war.

Bolo's case has been defined as but one of a series of inter-related incidents in the German effort to organize a propaganda of depression and discouragement among the civilian leaders and soldiers of France. These involved not only Bolo, the so-called "Levantine financier," but also Joseph Calliaux, a former premier of France, one or more members of the French chamber of deputies, and several French newspapers. These newspapers are alleged to have been subsidized by German money to spend abroad in France in a spirit of "defeatism," a belief that there was no hope of beating Germany, and that France should make haste to accept the best terms possible.

As Bolo's connection with the scheme was the first startling development in uncovering the plot, his name has since been applied to the whole system of German propaganda in France, and the new word "Boloism" was coined.

In the attempt to bribe French statesmen and leaders, and to influence French opinion by subsidizing her newspapers or founding new publications to disseminate the spirit of pacifism or defeat it has been charged that Germany devoted a sum of money ranging up to or even exceeding 10,000,000 marks. Bolo himself is said to have had the use of a fund of \$1,682,000, chiefly if not wholly to corrupt the French press. In what way the remainder of the corruption fund was expended had not been made clear up to the beginning of this year.

Partial uncovering of the plot has resulted not only in the arrest of Calliaux and Bolo, but in driving out of office of Louis J. Malvy, formerly the French minister of the interior, in the arrest of several editors of the newspaper Bonnet Rouge and its suppression on the ground that it had been subsidized to preach pacifism in the interest of Germany. One of the Bonnet Rouge's editors who threatened to make sensational disclosures was found strangled in his cell before he had a chance to reveal what he may have known of the plot. A few other newspapers alleged to have been founded in France to spread the German propaganda also were suppressed.

Bolo's activities possess peculiar interest to Americans because of the fact that, of the funds at his disposal, it is charged that \$1,682,000 was transferred from the Deutsche bank in Berlin to France by way of New York. It was as a result of discovery of his manipulation of this fund thru five New York banks or banking houses that Attorney General Merton E. Lewis of New York state was able to obtain information which was forwarded to the French ambassador at Washington, M. Jassierand, upon which Bolo was arrested.

Big Corn Shipments Being Rushed East

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 5.—Six thousand carloads of corn are being rushed daily to the markets of the East and intermediate points. It has been announced by Director General McAdoo.

The cities to be relieved first are New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore.

Large stores are moving also to Chicago, Kansas City and Omaha. Assurances have been given that with any degree of a let-up in the heavy weather the corn belt would be cleared of its burden of overproduction by the end of March. This will in turn take a great pressure off the demand on the wheat supply.

In addition, specific aid was afforded for New England in an order from the director general for the immediate movement of 300 carloads of animal and poultry feed for the Northeastern section. Two trains are moving from Cedar Rapids and two from Milwaukee.

An order was issued to Eastern railroad lines to turn over to the Western lines all available empty equipment in box cars and refrigerators. More than 1,000 cars will be moved into Chicago, and from there sent into the districts where they are most needed. They will be loaded with food stuffs and animal and poultry feed and be kept moving in an endless belt as long as the necessity exists.

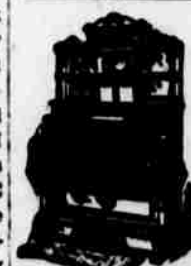
