CHILCOQUIN CHATTER

The ladies of Klamath Agency sent a 50-pound assortment of home made candies to the sixteen boys who have enlisted from the Klamath Indian reservation, nine of whom are Indians.

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Bedford and family of Klamath Agency have gone to Berkeley, Calif., where they will spend the next few weeks.

On the afternoon of February 2d, a well attended Indian farmers' meeting was held at the Modoc Point day school, for the general discussion of agricultural and irrigation problems. Short talks were made by J. M. Johnson, superintendent; J. F. Hutto, farmer; R. Ferguson, teacher, and H. W. Hinkle, irrigation engineer. Another meeting will be held in two weeks at the same place.

It is interesting to note that the best yield of oats obtained in Klamath County this year was on the farm of H. Orem, on the Modoc Point project, which produced 86 bushels of oats to the acre.

Country Faces Big Teacher Shortage

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—Faced by prospects of an increasing demand for and diminishing supply of school teachers for 1918-19, the employment service of the federal department of labor is sending to every state superintendent of education in the country a questionnaire, seeking accurate information as to the number of teachers available for next year, and possible sources of supply for vacancies.

The Chicago branch of the service has let it be known that the greatest difficulty thus far has been in obtaining instructors for high schools, the greater part of whose teaching forces have hitherto been composed of young men. Numbers of these instructors

have been called to the national army or have enlisted. The many special services which the government has been organizing have also drawn heavily on this class of teachers and from senior college students from among whom are usually recruited the annual additions to the school staffs.

Educational authorities have viewed with some concern the growing inroads on their profession which the war is making. They have, in many instances started organized efforts to fill the gaps in their ranks and have emphasized the importance of maintaining high standards of instruction in the public schools.

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 5.—A program of naval expansion is under contemplation by the Argentine government. It has been announced that President Irigoyen is considering the sending of a message to congress asking for an appropriation of \$50,000,000 for the construction of submarines, cruisers and hydroplanes.

Foot Ball Men Wanted For Aviation Service

CORVALLIS, Feb. 6.—Members of the football team of the Oregon Agricultural College and a number of college officials have begun an effort to determine how many first class, highly trained football men the college can provide for the flying section of the aviation branch of the United States Army Signal Corps. Letters have been sent to about all the football men of known varsity calibre calling attention to the pressing need for additional men in the aviation service. The government is said to desire that all men remain in training until they finish their work, if important for

government purposes, or until they receive a definite call to service. Special aptitude for aviation work has been evidenced by well trained football men, it is pointed out. The qualities of mental and bodily quickness, physical and moral courage, endurance and determination are precisely the qualities demanded of successful flyers. Their service also has been found to make a strong appeal to football men.

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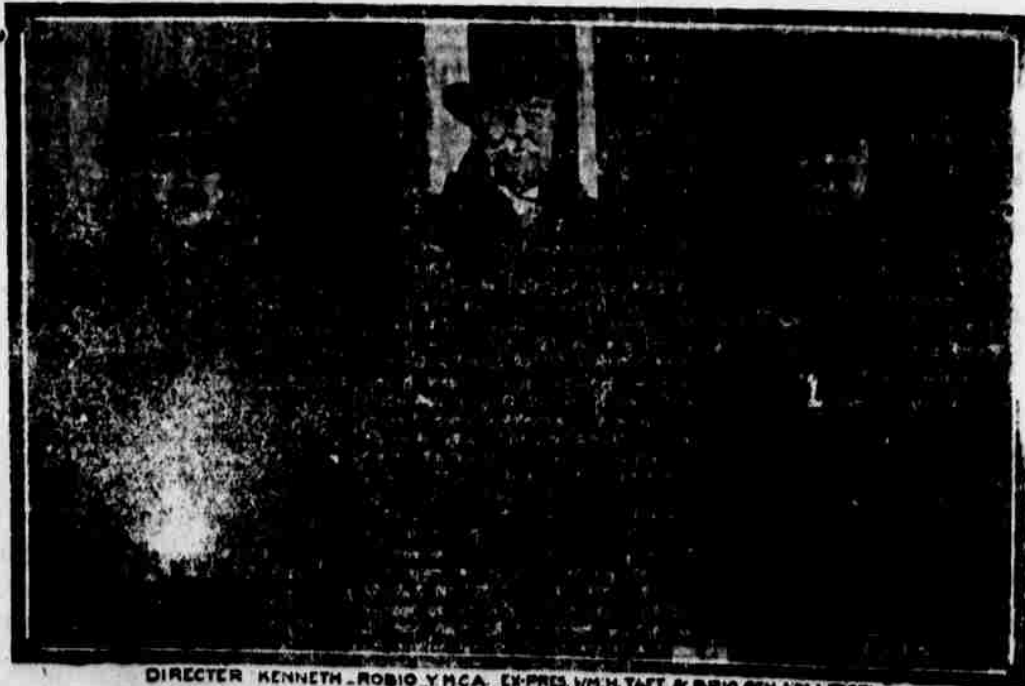
