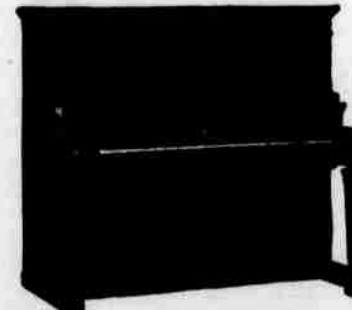

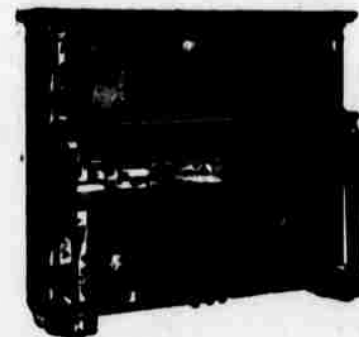

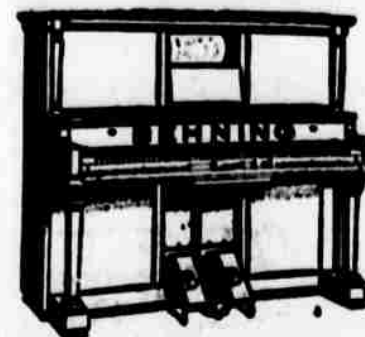

Klamath Falls

Move to Oust Public  
Service Commission

SALEM, Feb. 6.—To abolish the public service commission is the purpose of the proposed initiative measure submitted to Secretary of State Olcott by the citizen's committee of Portland for the purpose of having a ballot title prepared before petitions are circulated.

Members of the citizens' committee initiating the measure are Josephine R. Sharp chairman, Eleanor Florence Baldwin vice chairman, C. W. Barzee treasurer and James R. Whalen secretary, all of Portland.

The bill provides for the repeal of section 6875 of Lord's Oregon Laws, as amended by chapter 71, laws of 1915. This section provided for appointment of three members of the public service commission, and if it is repealed the public service commission will be abolished, altho the railroad commission and public utility laws will remain on the statutes, without, however, a commission to enforce them.
