A Woman Deputy Police Chief in New York City

Mrs. Ellen A. O'Grady, long a police matron in New York City, has been appointed fifth deputy police commissioner of the city, under the new mayor, who took office January 1st. She will draw a salary of \$6,000 a year. Never before has a mayor named a woman for this place. But the victory for woman suffrage in the November election moved Mayor Hylan to recognize women. Mrs. O'Grady will give her time largely to cases in which women and girls are concerned. She said she had gained her experience in "the school of hard work."



German Food Conditions Growing More Serious

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Secret knowledge in the possession of the British government regarding conditions in Germany may have influenced the uncompromising attitude adopted by the international council at Versailles. Food conditions in the central empires are known to be increasingly serious. The Russian "storehouse" upon which the central empires were counting to relieve their own hunger is still locked—because Leon Trotsky, Russian foreign minister, out-manuevered both the central empires and the Ukrainians. Germany's plight is indicated by the recent order forbidding relatives to send parcels of food to officers held prisoner in England and France, and directing that money be sent instead. This has resulted in cutting off the export of thousands of parcels from Germany weekly. The Exchange Telegraph declares that mail from relatives to prisoners totals 500,000 letters a fortnight. Incoming letters, it is said, reveal a state of affairs in Germany infinitely worse than heretofore reported. Diseases, due to under-nourishment are increasing, it is reported, and discontent is evidenced among all classes.

German War Losses Reported One Million

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 18.—(Correspondent of the Associated Press)—"From the beginning of the war up to the end of 1916 there were over a million more deaths in Germany than in normally the case," says the Berlin correspondent of the Mass-bode, in a statement on the effects of the war on the vital population statistics of the German empire. "For the first three years," continues the writer, "the entire loss by mortality is said to have been 3,700,000. Thus, instead of the normal increase of 3,400,000, there was on August 1, 1917, a decrease of 600,000, to which another 700,000 was added as a result of the decline in birth figures that still continues. The absolute decrease in the population after three years, therefore, would have been 2 per cent of the number at the beginning of the war."

"Other phenomena are to be expected for the near future. Instead of 14,000,000, the men between the ages of 17 and 45 will only number 12,700,000; and instead of 800,000, as now, the excess of women over men will be 3,100,000. It is not yet known how the war losses will be spread over the various ages, but it looks as if there will be 1,100 women to every 1,000 men of marriageable age. For these reasons, and in view of the fact that there will be a large number of invalids among the men, the marriage chances must be termed greatly reduced, a fact which will in its turn produce further shiftings on the labor market, that, on their part will again react on the population movement."

"The war is not regarded, at any rate by experts, as harmful for infants. Natural feeding is far more

week and one pound of oatmeal a month, and can do well on that. COPPER CENT IS AT LAST RECOGNIZED

HIGH PRICES BROUGHT ON BY WAR BRINGS HUMBLE PENNY TO POSITION OF RESPECT AT GOLDEN GATE CITY

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 7.—"The cent has come to stay." This seems to be the verdict of the merchants and store keepers of this city. One and two cent newspapers and the cafeteria started the circulation of the humble copper piece. The war has added the final impetus to its use.

To the average Easterner, who has always been used to seeing the cent in circulation, the foregoing may not be quite clear. In the early days of San Francisco no coin of a value less than 25 cents ever was used or seen. Later dimes and nickels began to appear, but even the high school boy of today can remember when the copper penny was something of a curiosity.

Within the past four or five years the cent piece has come more and more in evidence. It has become fully established in the department stores and cafeterias, and now Uncle Sam is popularizing it thru his thrift certificates. The thrift certificate increases one cent in value each month. It costs \$4.13 this month. It will cost \$4.14 in March. Incidentally, Uncle Sam has by this means given the cent a dignity which it previously did not possess here. There was a prejudice against it which is said to be fast disappearing, for the government has shown that the cent is as potent as the dollar in helping to win the war.

More than this, there is a demand for it, and on various occasions the East has been asked to ship cent pieces West, in order that the demand for them might be supplied. Business men generally have expressed the opinion that only by the use of the cent could both the retailer and consumer do business on a sound economic basis. It is new experience for San Franciscans, but they have come to enjoy it, if the demand for the copper piece is any criterion.
