FINE POULTRY IS AVAILABLE FROM O. A. C.

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a daily record of eggs laid by the pullets during the first year be sent in at the end of the year.

Following is an extract of the letter received by Agent Glaser:

"In answer to your inquiry, we have decided to send out from the experiment station a limited number of cockerels and cocks of the Oregon for the purpose of breeding up the egg-laying qualities of farm flocks in Oregon. It is believed that these males will on the average increase the production of farm flocks in the first generation 25 per cent. Eggs for hatching will also be sent, not to exceed three settings to one person. A charge will be made of \$3 each for males and \$1.50 per setting of thirteen eggs. It is not the intention to sell day-old chicks. Eggs will be sent out according to date of receipt of order, and it will not be possible always to send them on date requested. The male and eggs are sent out under some restrictions as to breeding. These are explained in circular. In sending order please sign the agreement and forward it with remittance to the poultry department, Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis.

The males and eggs will be sold this year only from the Oregon experiment station and the Oregon state hospital, Salem, where co-operative work is being done.

As is pretty generally known, the Oregon originated at the Experiment station from some experimental work in crossing barred, Plymouth Rocks and White Leghorns, nine years ago. In subsequent years the selection of breeding stock has been on the basis, first, of egg records, and second, of type. The purpose was to make them a good farm fowl with heavy egg production their first characteristic, and good meat qualities second.

Their good egg laying qualities have now been so thoroughly demonstrated that it is believed the public should have the benefit of them. As to their egg laying qualities, with proper care they will average 200 eggs or more in the pullet year."

U. S. TROOP TRANSPORT IS SUNK IN WAR ZONE

LATER—WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 7.—Latest official dispatches on the Tuscania disaster places the number of troops missing at 113, others 97; total lost, 210.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Thomas Smith of Glasgow, boatswain mate of the Tuscania, said the boat was hit at 5:47 Tuesday night. The launching of boats was commenced immediately. The soldiers were all lined up on deck, and unfortunately many jumped overboard, and many were thrown into the sea when the boats were lowered, as proper launching was rendered impossible by the steamer's list.

Smith's boat picked up fourteen soldiers. The boat had no cars, and the men paddled with their hands. They were picked up at 9 o'clock on Tuesday night.

PORTLAND, Feb. 7.—King Wilson, a prominent Oregon democrat, and Mayor of Oswego, died at a hospital here unexpectedly yesterday. He was 53 years of age.
