

FRANCE NOW READY TO FURNISH UNCLE SAM GUNS

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Announcement is made that France will be able before July 1st to manufacture enough artillery to supply twenty American divisions, or approximately 100,000 troops, if the United States meanwhile adheres to an understanding by which France would receive the necessary raw material from America, has been made here by Andre Tardieu, French high commis-

sioner to this country. M. Tardieu made the statement also that there are more American troops in France today than comprised the American army at the time the United States entered the war. At that time, he said, the American army contained about 112,000 officers and men.

The Fuel Situation Grows More Serious

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 5.—The fuel situation thruout the United States is becoming more desperate. Officials who, up to the present, have been extremely optimistic, admitted this fact. The only possible relief must come from the weather.

The railroads are doing their best, but most of them are almost out of commission. The mines are working, but under tremendous handicaps, due to the intense cold and the enormous snowdrifts which practically block them.

From almost every city and town in the east reports were being received that vital industries either were shutting down or were about to do so. In many places it has been necessary to commandeer coal from industrial establishments to keep people warm. Even here in Washington the public schools are closed, and it is estimated that more than 10,000 families are without fuel.

Many state fuel administrators have recommended to the fuel bureau that it order another general shutdown. In this connection suggestion has been made, and is being given consideration, that a four-day shutdown be ordered for the period ending with Lincoln's birthday, February 12th, and commencing tomorrow.

This would mean only one half day taken from industry, as Saturday is a half holiday, Sunday a whole holiday, Monday a workless day and Tuesday a legal holiday. What action will be taken has not yet been determined.

But shut downs will afford only temporary relief, officials say. The weather is the big controlling factor. Moderate weather for a week or ten days over the eastern half of the United States would afford a complete remedy. But until trains can be moved on normal schedule, the coal cannot be delivered anywhere.

Imports To U. S. May Be Reduced One-Half

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 5.—A sweeping move to force neutral shipping into service almost exclusively between the United States and the allied nations is under consideration by this government.

President Wilson is expected soon to announce the creation of a new "imports board," designed to save tonnage by eliminating unnecessary imports into the United States.

The proposal which has been laid before the president provides for a board of probably four members—a representative of each of the shipping board, war industries board and war trade board, and a fourth man not associated with any of these departments.

Pressure has been placed upon Great Britain to contribute shipping for movement of American troops and supplies. Conferences between

French, British and American officials have been going on for some time, and, while no announcement has been made of the fact, it is understood England is prepared to throw vast amounts of additional shipping into the trans-Atlantic trade to help thru the crisis.

By forming the board it is expected to reduce greatly imports now carried by neutrals to this country and automatically throw those ships into needed service between the United States and allied countries.

By restricting the imports into this country from 50 to 60 per cent the deficit threatened in American shipbuilding thru extreme weather and railroad tieups could be made up by neutral countries turning their tonnage to allied shipping instead of imports for the United States, it is estimated.

McAdoo Opposes the Building of Homes

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 7.—Secretary McAdoo has extended his plan for conserving capital and labor to include the prospective home builder. A statement just made by him reads:

"Because of the interest of the treasury department in the conservation of capital and credit during the period of the war, I have received several inquiries as to whether building operations of one kind or another should be discontinued. With regard

to plans for public buildings under control of the department, I have stopped letting contracts except in cases where they were absolutely necessary.

"Home building is an excellent thing in normal times, but at present, unless there is a real shortage of houses for war workers, I strongly advise that materials, valuable labor and credit be not utilized for this purpose. Whether homes should be built should be determined strictly by the urgency of the need."
