TWENTY-ONE THOUGHT LOST FOUND SAFE

PHONE MESSAGE RECEIVED HERE YESTERDAY CONFIRMED IN WASHINGTON DISPATCH. TOTAL LOSS REDUCED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13. The safety of twenty-one more soldiers, six of which were from Oregon, is made known in the announcement that twenty-one men were taken from the ship at Halifax, due to illness. Those from Oregon are Carl Jacobs, Elk City; Stephen Mead, Reed; Edward F. Parker, Grants Pass; Ray E. Powerson, Mill City; Elvin O. Stephens, Springfield, and Archie D. Roberts, Salem.

This dispatch, which arrived just after the Herald went to press yesterday, confirms the telephone report received from Grants Pass published yesterday. Many in this community are rejoicing with the sisters here of Mr. Parker, who had been given up as lost.

Special Cable Rates To Those In Service

Special telegram rates to soldiers, sailors and nurses now in the war zone has been announced by the Western Union Telegraph company, which will prove welcome news to the parents, relatives and many friends of the fighting forces abroad.

Week end letter telegrams of a social character may be sent to the American forces who may be in England or France at a rate of 9 cents a word from the Pacific Coast states, which rates disregards the usual minimum charge applicable in the case of ordinary week-end telegrams.

The messages will bear the indication "EFM," which must be counted and charged for, and should be addressed to "Amexforce, London," when intended for members of the naval forces.

The name of the addressee and the name of the regiment or medical unit or naval ship or naval unit, with which the addressee is serving must be given as the first text words.

The messages are, of course, at the sender's risk, and subject to censorship and delay.
