Want Northern Range
For California CattleStockmen of Southern California Will
Suffer Great Losses Unless They
Can Get Their Herds to Grazing
Lands in the Northern
Part of State

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 15.—There are 800 head of cattle at Fresno and 50 more in Santa Barbara county looking for good grazing lands in Northern California, according to a message received by H. S. Maddox, secretary of the chamber of commerce and food administrator for the city of Sacramento. The word comes from D. C. Beers, a big cattleman of the southern part of the state, who reports that unless proper grazing territory is found for his cattle within a short time there is danger of a serious loss.

Maddox gave the word out to the public in the hope that it would reach land owners of Northern California who had grazing lands available, and who would communicate with the chamber of commerce, offering reasonable terms along patriotic lines of helping to save the beef supply of the state.

The matter is also being taken up with the state council of defense that a speedy solution of the problem be reached and arrangements made for shipping the cattle north in case the lands can be found available.

Railway Workers Leave
Because of Low Wages

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 15.—The first official indication of what proposed railroad wage increases would cost was given at a hearing of the railroad wage commission, when J. A. Franklin presented the claims of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor.

Figuring an average of 33 1-3 per cent increase, on the flat increase asked, the additional cost would be \$32,000,000 annually, Secretary Lane, chairman of the commission, computed.

Mr. Franklin said the estimate seemed correct, based upon increases for 250,000 organized men. He suggested that any increases should apply to unorganized workers of the same trades, numbering about 260,000, who were not figured in the rough calculation. The wage basis asked was \$6 a day for skilled men and \$4.50 a day for helpers.

Low wages have been blamed by the witnesses for the exodus of railroad workers to other industries, with the result that many skilled men have been lost. Mr. Franklin said the various shop unions he represented had lost 15 per cent of their membership to shipyards and still others to munitions factories.

Klamath Boy First
To Ask for Bonds

Martin Adams, the 13-year-old son of J. Frank Adams of this city, who is now recovering from an operation at the Klamath hospital, is believed to be the first person in the state of Oregon to apply for the third Liberty Loan bonds.

His check for \$500, accompanies the application to Campaign Manager Charles J. Ferguson, who is greatly pleased over its receipt.

It is believed that this precedent set by a small boy will prove a good example for many of the older ones to follow during the coming campaign.

OREGONIANS MAY
STILL EAT CHICKENS

PORTLAND, Feb. 15.—Oregon farmers are exempted from the new federal food administration rule forbidding the "purchase, shipment or sale of live or freshly killed hens or

pullets after April 31st." Chicken dinners will, therefore, continue to be in order for those who prefer this dainty morsel of food. The food law applies only to licensed dealers. The farmer can dispose of his product as he sees fit at the public market or at unlicensed stores.

Boston has now joined hands with Chicago, New York and Pittsburgh in the matter of cheaper taxi fares. The mediums whereby this move has been accomplished were a consolidation of the city's two larger taxi companies and a fleet of fifty new taxicabs, with especially built bodies mounted in Dodge Brothers chassis.
