

# HUNS FAIL IN ATTACK ON AMERICANS

## AMERICAN POSITIONS BOMBARDED WITH GAS

GERMANS HANG OVER TRENCHES THREE HOURS WITHOUT CANON FIRE. AMERICANS TO UNITED STATES TROOPS—GERMAN AIRPLANES DRIVEN OFF

AMERICAN LEADERS BELIEVE MANSUETUDE OF CENTRAL POWERS WILL NOT PERMIT HUN ARMIES TO RESUME OFFENSIVE AGAINST WESTERN FRONT

DATELESS—The American positions east of St. Mihiel have been bombarded by gas for two hours, but the Hun were unsuccessful in their attempts to harm the American troops. German airplanes accompanied the attack in great numbers, but were driven off by the birdmen of the sky.

It is reported that gas fumes reeked over the American trenches three hours without injuring the men.  
Friday, which was the day the German advertised they would attack British and French armies, passed quietly.  
All the Russian Central Executive committee of Workmen's Soldiers' Deputies approved of the action of the Russian representatives at Brest-Litovsk.  
Members of the committee said that the management of Germany and Austria should not permit further offensive against Russia by their governments.  
The emperor has summoned the heads of the German navy to headquarters for a conference.  
The vice chancellor is to announce the future submarine policy to the Reichstag in the near future.

## ELECTION AT SHASTA VIEW IS ON TODAY

IRRIGATION DISTRICT TO BE ESTABLISHED WHICH WILL TAKE STEPS TO PUMP WATER ON LARGE ACREAGE

The election for the permanent establishment of the Shasta View irrigation district is being held today at the Shasta View school house near Malin. It is believed that the election will carry by a heavy majority.  
This district, if established, will take steps to get a large acreage around the Adams Point under water by pumping from the canal of the U. S. R. S. project. Eleven thousand acres are reported to be embodied in the enterprise, which constitutes some of the most fertile lands of Klamath County.

The present plan is to purchase a water right for the lands of the district from the government, which water would be delivered at the pumping plant by the government at a fixed price per acre for a water right on the twenty-year payment plan, without interest. The cost of the distribution system, which commences at the pumping plant, must be borne by the district. To take care of this expense the district will probably issue bonds which must bear 6 per cent interest and sell at par.

## APPEAL OF HURLEY IS REFUSED

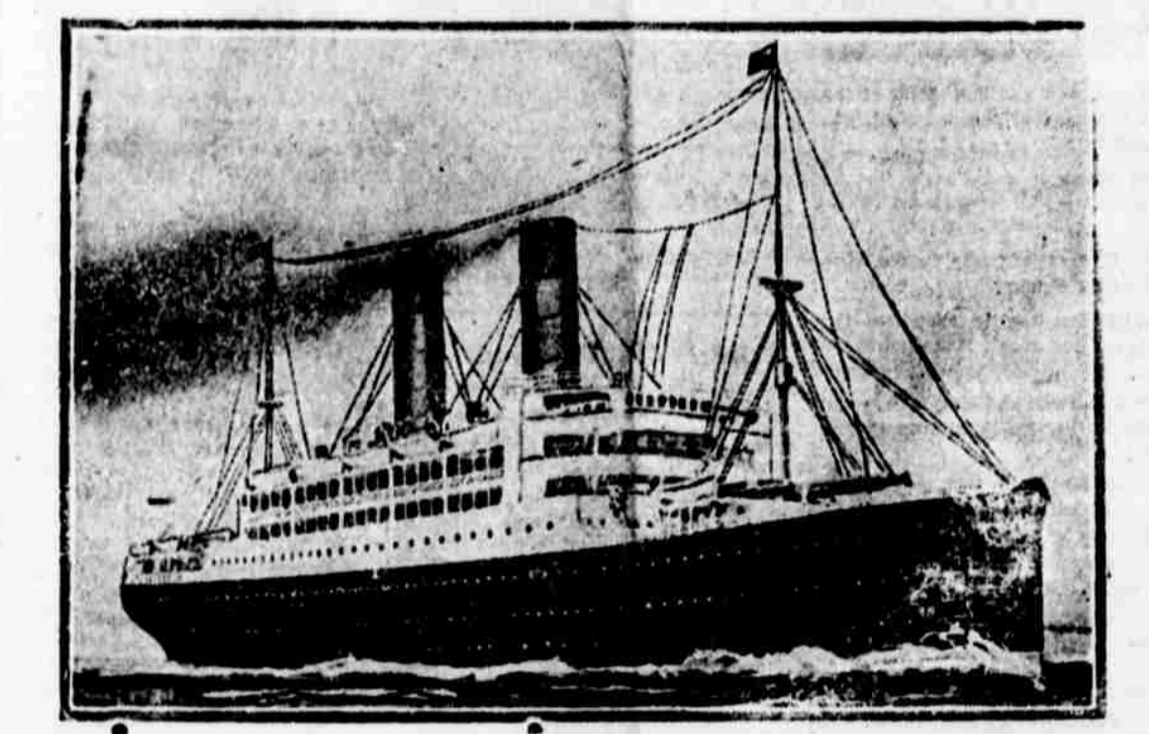

## British Transport Recently Sunk With 2,179 Americans Aboard



The British transport Tuscania, former Cunard liner, was sunk by a German submarine off the north coast of Ireland while she carried 2,179 American troops. Despite all the efforts of the Germans to prevent the landing of American troops in France and England, this is the first transport they have succeeded in sinking. And the loss on this vessel was probably fewer than one hundred army men.

## MUCH LOGGING BEING DONE THRU COUNTY

ALGOMA LUMBER COMPANY GETS OUT HUGE QUANTITY OF LOGS. LOGGING SUPERINTENDENT JOINS MARINES

Harry Messner, logging superintendent of the Algoma Lumber company, left this morning for Portland, where he will enlist in the marines. Mr. Messner states that the winter season has been very successful on account of the open winter. The Algoma Lumber company, the Pelican Bay company and several smaller camps have been in operation all winter getting out logs. The Algoma Lumber company now has about three and a quarter million feet of logs from their reservation tract.

Great preparations are being made for a busy summer, and a great deal of new machinery is being installed. A new McGiffert loader has been installed at the Algoma camp. This company expects to build five or six miles of new railroad this spring.

The Pelican Bay Lumber company will build about seventeen miles of new railroad to tap their new tract.

H. G. Wirtz, formerly with the Weed Lumber company, will take the position of logging superintendent now left vacant by Mr. Messner, who has been with the company for a number of years.

## PROMINENT OREGONIAN IN TOWN

PRESIDENT OF OREGON SENATE AND ANNOUNCED CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR MAKING FRIENDS IN CITY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 16.—The American consul at Tiflis has reported that General Kalendines, the Cossack leader in Ukraine, has suddenly dropped from sight, and is now believed to be dead. This report is unconfirmed.

## TIE UP OF EASTERN SHIPYARDS THREATENS

NEW YORK LEADERS CLAIM SEVENTH THOUSAND MEN NOW STRIKING FOR HIGHER WAGES. WILL APPEAL TO PRESIDENT TO INTERVENE

WAGE ADJUSTMENT BOARD AGREES ON INCREASE OF WAGES, SCALE OF WHICH IS LOWER THAN THAT OF THE PACIFIC COAST

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—It is expected that an appeal will be made direct to the president to intervene in the shipyard workers' strike by the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners.  
The strike leaders claim that 7,000 or 8,000 men are now on a strike, which is threatening to tie up work along the whole Atlantic coast.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 16.—Shipping board officials say that less than 1,000 men are now striking. It is declared that the wage adjustment board has agreed on an increase of wages, with overtime pay for the Delaware shipyard workers. It is said that this may affect the New York strike. The new scale of wages is lower than that on the Pacific coast.

## TUSCANIA LIST OF VICTIMS OVER 200

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 16.—Ten names appearing on the list of eighty-one identified dead, announced last night, apparently bring the Tuscania American soldier victims up to 174. The war department's report of the survivors is still incomplete. Over 200 men still remain unaccounted for.

## Riverside School Goes Over the Top

Pupils at the Riverside school in this city are a mighty proud set of youngsters, as this institution is the first in the community to "go over the top" in raising its required amount for the Junior Red Cross, according to City School Superintendent R. H. Dunbar.  
The Junior Red Cross differs from

the other organizations, in that the memberships are taken by schools rather than individuals, the quota being 25 cents per head for each student carried. The quota for the Riverside school was \$45 and the amount raised yesterday was \$45.65. As soon as the required amount was raised the pupils were given Junior Red Cross buttons.
