CHILOQUIN CHATTER

The Liberty Loan state central committee has appointed Harvey W. Hincks of the Indian Irrigation service to assist Captain Charles J. Ferguson in the third Liberty Loan drive. He will have charge of the Klamath reservation district. The Indians are very much interested in the Liberty bonds, and they will have their share of names in the Blue List.

The postmaster general has sent out letters of inquiry relative to the proposed change in the mail route from Klamath Falls to Chiloquin. This is in response to a recent petition forwarded to Washington requesting that the present stage route be abandoned, and daily mail service by train be substituted. This change would be a saving to the government in expense, and would bring Chiloquin twenty-four hours closer to Klamath Falls. About 500 patrons of the Chiloquin postoffice would be benefited by the proposed service by train.

Fifty timbermen in the logging camp of Charles Otey have been busy the past few months felling pine timber in the Sprague River canyon east of Chiloquin. Two million feet of logs are in the river now, ready for the spring drive.

Harold Crane, formerly of the Indian forest service, has been operating a logging camp near Silver's resort all winter, with a crew of twenty-five men. He has about 1,000,000 feet of logs decked and which he is now hauling to the Williamson River for delivery to the Modoc Lumber company.

8 ENGLISH BOATS SUNK BY ENEMY

PATROL BOATS AND TRAWLER SUNK IN RAID BY GERMAN DESTROYERS IN THE STRAITS OF DOVER

LONDON, Feb. 16.—Eight British craft hunting submarines have been sunk by a raiding flotilla of enemy destroyers. After sinking these vessels, seven of which were "drifters" and one trawler, the destroyers returned rapidly northward before they could be engaged.

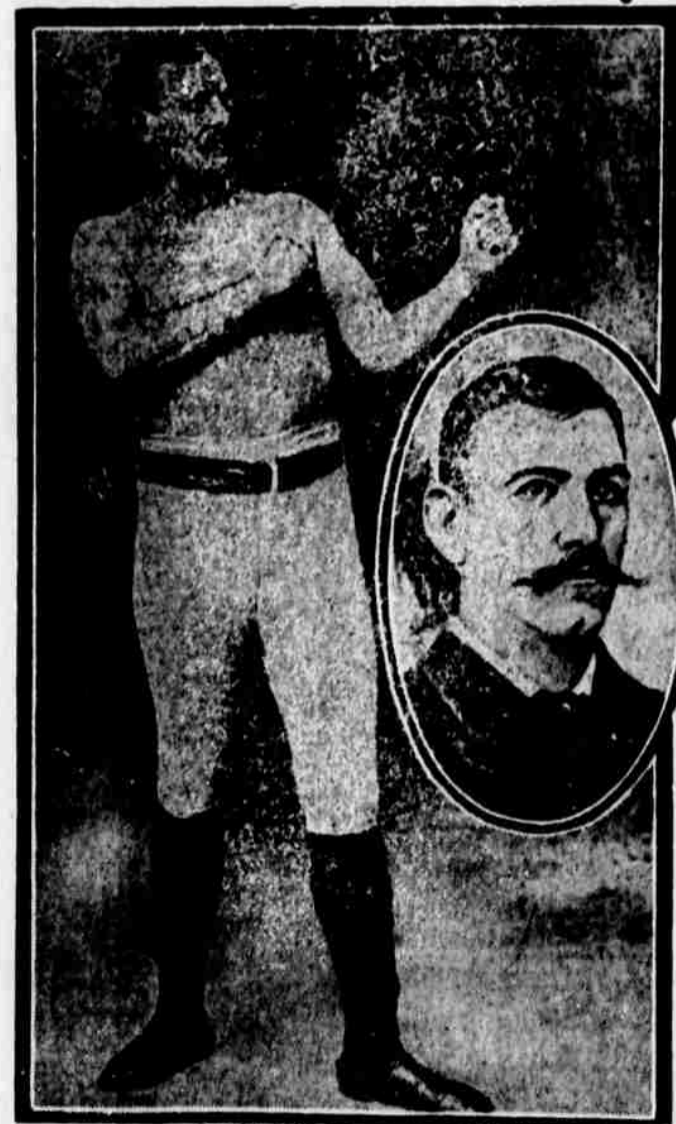

Sullivan Dies 36 Years After He Won Heavyweight Title From Paddy Ryan



John L. Sullivan, perhaps the greatest ring hero American lovers of the fight game have known, died of heart disease at his home at Abington, Mass., almost thirty-six years to a day after he had won the American heavy weight championship from Paddy Ryan.
