Shipyard Volunteers Are Not Needed Yet

PORTUAND, Feb. 18.—Advises received from Washington by Franklin T. Griffith, state director of the United States public service reserve, showed that the first few days results of the nation wide drive for shipyard volunteers had amounted to one-half of the desired enrollment.

About 20,000 enrollment agents are at work in the different states.

"The national drive will continue one week more," National Director W. E. Hall telegraphed from Washington, "and thereafter will be continued in every state until its quota has been

completed. More important than speed in attaining the quota is to get suitable men and make it clear that the reserve is being built up for future needs, and that men should not leave their jobs or expect immediate employment, but that they should enroll for service and wait until the United States department of labor notifies them that they are needed in the shipyards.

"Much hardship results from the impression that men are needed in quantities at the yards today."

Total enrollment in Oregon up to Friday was reported at 1,224.

Repatriated French Children Get First Milk in Three Years From American Woman

Save Your Fats For Uncle Sam

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 18.—

Fats are the most precious thing in this war. Germany is nearer breaking for want of fats than any other country.

Hindenburg himself not long ago gave notice that unless his troops and the munition makers got more fats, something would happen in Germany.

Fats supply energy. When people go hungry they draw on the fats in their bodies. When that is gone they are an easy prey to disease. Some fats have stuff in them for growth. Without fats, people weaken and waste away.

Our armies use fats by shipload. Glycerine, which comes from fat, is one of the chief things for making modern explosives. We must have fats to keep up the fight.

Save fats. Do not limit your supplies of milk, table butter and cheese, but consume all. Don't waste any. You can cut the consumption of fats by reducing pastry and fried foods. Use cottonseed or corn oil or peanut oil for cooking. Use drippings.

Trim your own meat and melt the fat. Don't let a scrap get into the garbage pail.

Waste no soap. Save the scraps.
