**Great Changes Noted
At American Lake**

**Wonderful Development Takes Place
During Past Five Months. Sur-
prising Additions Made for the
Convenience of Soldiers
and Their Visitors**

CAMP LEWIS, Wash., Feb. 15.—
Five months have elapsed since Camp
Lewis received its first quota of se-
lective draft men, fresh from civilian
life, to be given the military training
necessary in the building of an army.
In that comparatively short period the
improvements in both the physical
condition of the men and their train-
ing camp have been marked. It is in-
teresting to compare the camp of to-
day with the partially completed camp
which greeted the first contingent
early in September, 1917.

Officers who had been assigned to
organize the first units which the men
were to form, were present to conduct
the recruits to their regiments. The
first California contingent, for in-
stance, was taken to the 363d Infan-
try regiment, which was subsequently

entirely filled with men from the
Golden State. From the mustering
tents to the 363d the men walked
across a deserted prairie fringed with
pines. The road was not even graded.

When the second draft arrives they
will find a military training camp
complete in every detail, from the
large administration building down to
the horse corrals in the remount
depot. Even the grounds about the
barracks have been graded and beau-
tified by the present occupants. Paved
thoroughfares have been constructed,
scores of additional buildings erected,
a most efficient hospital system cre-
ated, places of amusement opened for
the enlisted men, a hostess house com-
pleted, a post laundry is operating,
and numerous other improvements
have been made.

**Third Liberty Loan
To Get Big Response**

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 19.—While
nothing definite has been given out as
yet concerning the particulars of the
third Liberty Loan, which is expected
to be launched in the near future, offi-
cials of the federal reserve bank here
already are organizing their forces
and making ready for the drive.

According to these officials the first
loan required educating the people,
not only to the government's need of
money, but the meaning of a govern-
ment bond. The United States was
not a bond buying country—that is
bonds were not bought by the general
public. The second loan found a
quicker response in selling almost
double the amount of bonds to twice
as many buyers, and those in charge
of the campaign in the Twelfth Fed-
eral Reserve district believe that the
public pulse has now so quickened
that the third Liberty Loan will be
greeted with real enthusiasm.

There are two general classes upon
whom special efforts will be centered

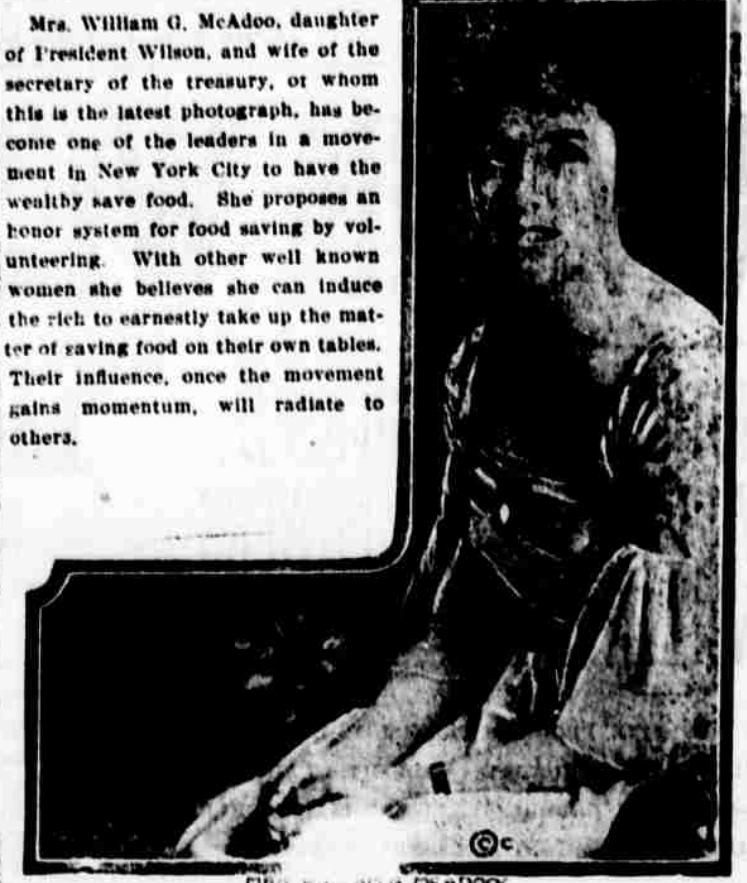
in the third loan. They are, first,
those who have not bought any gov-
ernment bonds; and second, those
who have not invested enough. The
others who have bought according to
their ability can be relied upon to do
their part in the third loan.

Governor James K. Lynch of the
Federal Reserve bank has not receiv-
ed any definite information concern-
ing the third loan, as to amount, in-
terest it will bear, or time it will be
offered to the public. He feels cer-
tain, however, that the third loan will
not be offered before March 1st, and
possibly as late as April 1st.

"If the citizens of the United States
fully realized the crisis that we are
now facing could understand what it
means if we lose the war, and how
important it is that every energy be
bent, not only to winning the war, but
winning it quickly, thousands would
form in line in front of our banks the
first day the third Liberty Loan is
offered," said a prominent banker in
a recent Liberty Loan conference.

**President's Daughter In
Movement to Save Food**

Mrs. William G. McAdoo, daughter
of President Wilson, and wife of the
secretary of the treasury, or whom
this is the latest photograph, has be-
come one of the leaders in a move-
ment in New York City to have the
wealthy save food. She proposes an
honor system for food saving by vol-
unteering. With other well known
women she believes she can induce
the rich to earnestly take up the mat-
ter of saving food on their own tables.
Their influence, once the movement
gains momentum, will radiate to
others.

**San Francisco Scouts
Making Great Headway**

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 19.—More
than \$50,000, the mark set, was se-
cured for the San Francisco Boy
Scout organization in a recent cam-
paign instituted to secure funds for
the carrying on of the work. Ten
thousand dollars of this will be set
aside for the purchase of acreage on
which a permanent camp of instruc-
tion will be constructed, where the
boys can put into practice what they
have learned in theory.

During the past year the roster of

scouts in this city has grown from
193 boys to 1,704, and it is proposed
to interest at least 5,000 youngsters
in the movement during the next
three years. Men prominent in busi-
ness affairs of the city are at the
head of the movement, and the gener-
ous response met by the workers
when soliciting funds has convinced
them that the 5,000 quota of boys
will be exceeded. There are approx-
imately 25,000 boys in this city el-
ligible for membership in this organiza-
tion.

**GERMAN BOMBS ARE
FOUND IN NORWAY**

CHRISTIANIA, Feb. 19.—Fresh
discoveries of bombs of German origin
have been found in Norway. A large
store of bombs intended to blow up
ships carrying iron ore to England
was uncovered a few days ago at Kir-
kenes, a seaport. Nine large bombs
and a number of smaller engines of
destruction were located at Findelin
in a room formerly occupied by al-

leged accomplices of Baron Reuten-
fels, whose operations were extensiv-
ely several months ago.
