Airplane Manufacture To Begin In Ireland

DUBLIN, Feb. 20.—The development of aircraft factories and shipyards in Ireland this spring is expected to open up a new industrial era in many sections of the country. Lack of facilities for technical training in the south of Ireland has been a long-standing problem, which the new factories and yard will help to solve.

For the present the business of airplane manufacture will be carried on in existing buildings that are being placed at the disposal of the government, but as rapidly as possible new factories of the most up-to-date type will be erected. The development is not intended to be merely of temporary character.

Flight stations and training depots which are being erected in various parts of the island are permanent

structures, as it is believed that Ireland from its geographical position, will have an important share in the post-war commercial development of aviation. It will be the gateway for every attempt at trans-Atlantic flight, attempts which are expected to be fostered and encouraged by the governments of both the United States and Great Britain.

Ship building will center in Dublin and Cork. Efforts are being made to secure a national shipyard for Dublin, which will also be the site of the largest of the aircraft factories, employing 2,000 skilled men and 2,000 girls. The minimum wage paid to women workers in the aircraft factories, it is announced, will be \$7.50 a week, which is about three times the average wage paid to women at present, except in munition works.

C., Feb. 20.—An amendment to the food bill to fix 1918 wheat at \$2.65 a bushel, instead of \$2, as now authorized, was introduced by Senator Thompson, and referred to the agricultural committee. Amendments fixing the price at \$2.50 were introduced recently by Senator Gore, and another naming \$2.75 was presented by Senator McCumber.

Lowly Mudhen Is To Soon Become Delicacy

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 20.—The California State Fish and Game Commission has launched an extensive publicity campaign in favor of the much maligned "mud hen" as a means of food conservation.

According to the commission, the common coot or "mud hen" already has established itself as a valuable bird in the South and parts of the East, but in the presence of so great a supply of more choice wildfowl, thus far has failed to find general recognition in California.

Realizing that only thru wide publicity could the people be made familiar with the many good foods that annually go to waste, the state board has been stimulating all possible use of birds that most hunters throw away.

The worst thing about the "mud hen" is its name, and the prejudice that this has built up against it, according to the board.

Leading hotels have served them as "water chicken" and "tule hen."

Known South as "poule d'eau," and served a la creole, they attained a more than local fame in New Orleans.

Mud hens are perhaps better relished by their French name, which is more truly descriptive of their habits, as they are a water bird, rather than a mud frequenter. Their diet is identical with that of ducks.

In general they are to be handled like rabbits in preparation for the table. Stews are the general method of cooking; but those willing to pluck fat ones can roast them and have a bird little inferior to a duck, except milder in flavor. Soaking the birds several days in cheap claret imparts a most delicious flavor, and is a method followed by some of the most celebrated cooks, one of whom has been serving mud hens in his cafe for nearly twenty years in Los Angeles as "salmi of duck," delighting thousands who never suspected that they were eating the same mud hen that had been left to lie before their guns as supposedly worthless.

Burro Beef Now Southern Delicacy

NOGALES, Ariz., Feb. 20.—Burro beef is the latest addition to the list of foods brought to the fore by war conditions. In the Altar district of the state of Sonora, Mexico, burros are now being slaughtered for their food value. Sonora, while not directly interested in the war, has felt its economic effects, according to Mexicans affiliated with the state government.

The burro of the Altar district is said to be worthless as a beast of burden, hence his use for food causes no loss in other ways. The animals are slaughtered at a soap plant at Sarac, where the fat is reclaimed for use in

soap making, the hides are taken for lariats and thongs, and the carcasses are immersed in a garlic bath, which removes any unpalatable flavor. The meat is then sold to soldiers in Sonora and Sinaloa, who are said to have pronounced the "beef" tender, juicy and excellent.

The demand created by these methods, it is said, has thinned the burro supply so greatly the Mexicans using any of the little beasts as domestic animals are compelled to keep them in fenced enclosures. It is said that any of them running at large are soon hunted down and taken to the slaughter pens.

BOARD TO STUDY UNSINKABLE SHIPS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 20.—Secretary Daniels has announced appointment of a special board of officers headed by Rear Admiral A. G. Winterhalter to study the whole question of non-sinkable ships, with special reference to the construction installed on board the former Austrian steamer Lucia, in an effort to make her torpedo proof. This construction is described as consisting of a series of "buoyancy boxes."

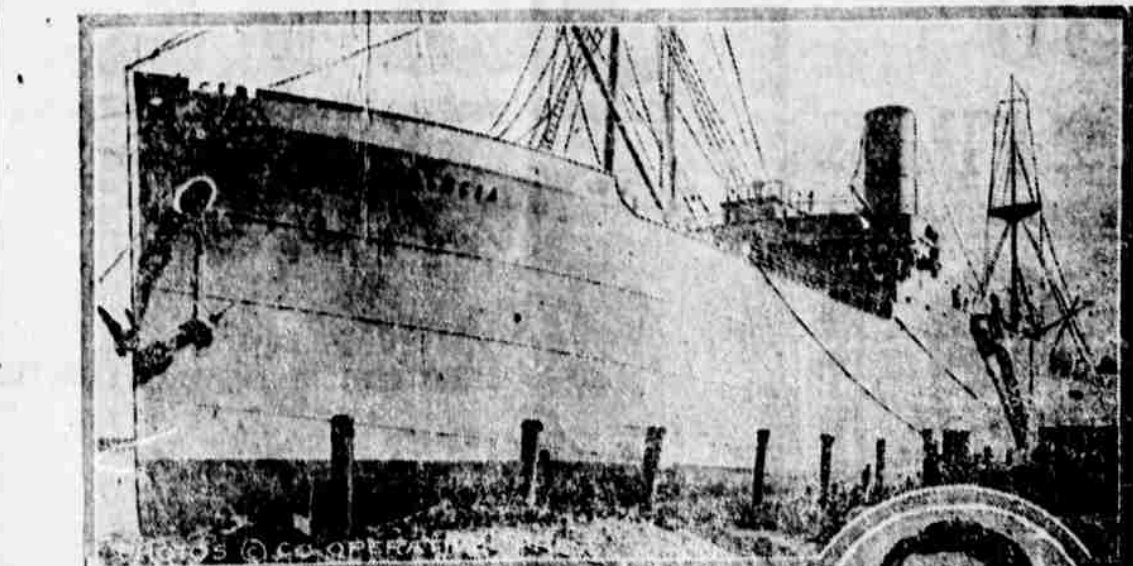
The board will include Captain O. W. Coenser, Naval Construction; Robert Stocker and William G. Dubois, and one other officer to be named.

UNCLE SAM TO BUY VEGETABLES AT SALEM

SALEM, Feb. 20.—Upon receipt of a message from United States Senator McNary stating that the war department expects to purchase a large quantity of dried vegetables here, it was learned that the Salem-Kings Product company will try to secure the contract. The company's plant has been closed down temporarily while machinery is prepared to handle the expected order.

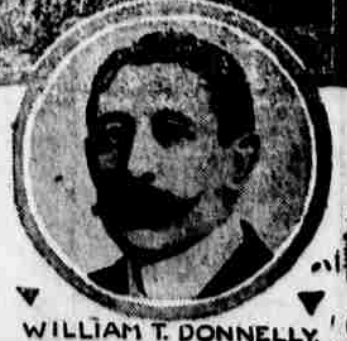
Two hundred and fifty tons of potatoes now are on hand, the manager of the company said, and twenty carloads of turnips are on the way.

Australian Ship Made Unsinkable By Submarines, and the Inventor



William T. Donnelly of New York City, consulting engineer and member of the government committee on ship protection, has applied his device to make ships unsinkable by submarines to the seized Austrian liner Lucia, and she is believed now to be safe from undersea boat attack. The device has been given without charge by the inventor to the government. It consists of a large number of wooden boxes three feet long by two feet

wide and one foot thick, covered with sheet iron and solder to make them airtight. These are placed against the hull within the ship and against the ceilings of her decks. Even when a vessel fills with water from the hole of a torpedo she will float, it is believed. The cost of installing the device is 10 per cent of the cost of the vessel, Mr. Donnelly says, and shipbuilders have told him they are anxious to go on with other vessels. Since insurance of ships has at times dur-

ing the war cost 100 per cent, the price for installing the device is considered almost insignificant.
