WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 20.—Secretary Baker has declared today that no date has been selected yet for the beginning of the second draft. He stated that the government does not wish to disturb the labor situation, particularly in the planting season, which is partially responsible for the delay.

WOMAN BANK CLERK PROVED KIBBLER

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 20.—Women bank clerks virtually have replaced men in Germany from the early days of the war, but the first case of an embezzling woman bank clerk has just occurred in Berlin. The accused girl, Rosa Neuman, was convicted of stealing \$6,000 in Russian securities from the Dresdner bank, and was sentenced to eight months' imprisonment. She stated during the trial that she had spent all of the proceeds on food and theater tickets.
