Corn Bread Sticks Latest In South

EL PASO, Texas, Feb. 21.—Corn bread sticks are a new substitute for wheat bread on wheatless days in many El Paso homes. One El Paso housewife received a baking pan from a friend in Kentucky in which 12 sticks of corn bread could be baked at one time. These, when done, are the

size of a stick of old-fashioned sealing wax, and practically all crust, claimed to be the best part of corn bread. Other housewives, after sampling the corn bread sticks, sent for pans, and now many El Paso homes have "liberty sticks," as the corn bread sticks are called here, served on wheatless days.

Small Per Cent of Food Lost By U-Boats

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 21.—Launched and maintained with the avowed purpose of starving the allies, Germany's U-boat campaign has miserably failed.

New figures given congress by Herbert Hoover show a loss of but seven per cent in food shipments during 1917.

Starting at the high water month last April, when 12 per cent went down, the food ship toll has steadily

decreased. In October and November but "one or two per cent" was lost.

But Hoover warned more sharply against railroad failure in this country. This already, he said, has hurt food shipments vastly more than the enemy.

"The number of grain cars reaching terminals during the ten months ending with January was 100,000 less than during the same period in 1916," Hoover said.

Civil War Veterans Passing Very Fast

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 21.—Veterans of the Civil War are dying at the rate of 100 daily, according to Orlando A. Somers, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic. Mr. Somers made this announcement during patriotic exercises in this city in honor of Abraham Lincoln and the Union defenders.

Mr. Somers said there were now living approximately 367,000 veterans, according to the pension office

at Washington, and he added that the country would have suffered a great loss after they had all passed away, inasmuch as they had been a commanding factor in keeping patriotism alive in this country.

"We may have to send 10,000,000 men across the water before the war-crazed maniac of Europe will admit he is crushed and beaten, but in the end there can be but one outcome—our armies will return victors," Mr. Somers declared.

HUNS FAIL TO OBSERVE FOOD REGULATIONS

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 21.—Close upon 400,000 prosecutions for infringing the food regulations were conducted in Prussia in 1917; 151,421 fines of varying amounts were inflicted and 1,781 persons were sentenced to terms of imprisonment. The courts are congested with cases of this description.

PUNISHED FOR GIVING ADVICE

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 21.—An 18-year-old German workman has been sentenced to six weeks' imprisonment in Berlin for calling out to a passing detachment of soldiers: "Throw away your rifles and make an end of it."

Germans Are Worried Over Financial Matters

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—The steady increase in Germany's national debt, owing to the war and the delay in adopting a sweeping plan of taxation reform to care for the increased liabilities of the empire, already more than twenty times higher than the national debt at the outbreak of the war, is a source of constant concern to German financial experts.

In the Berlin Tageblatt of January 5, Arthur Norden, the paper's financial expert, sharply criticizes the failure of the government to provide for any redemption of the war debt aside from a proviso establishing a redemption fund for the 4 1/2 per cent treasury certificates, which formed a small part of the last two war loans. He calls for radical measure to check the piling up of the burden of war indebtedness.

Norden contrasts with the policy of Germany, which, as is known, has not provided even enough increased taxation to meet the interest on its war debt, and is paying a part of the interest coupons of earlier war loans from new borrowings, with that of Great Britain, which, he points out, has raised by taxation almost 25 per cent of its war expenditures down to the end of 1917.

The argument that a heavier taxation of war profits, which make up the bulk of the nominal increase in Germany's capital, would interfere with the productiveness of German industry and the fear that increased taxation of incomes would kill the war-willingness of the population are dismissed as unfounded. In fact, Mr. Norden argues, to attack the abnormally high war incomes attained in certain industries and by certain elements of the population would be of

deduced value in cutting down the high cost of living resulting from the extravagant standards of life among the war profiteers.

STATE BAKERS ARE FAILING TO DO DUTY

ORDER FOR USING FLOUR SUBSTITUTES NOT GETTING PROPER RESPONSE — STERNUOUS MEASURES TO BE ADOPTED

PORTLAND, Feb. 20.—Assistant Food Administrator Ayre has issued a warning to Oregon bakers who are reported generally to not be observing the order for the use of flour substitutes.

After February 24th, when 30 per cent of the substitutes must be used, the bakers failing to comply with the order will be denied licenses and the right to purchase flour.

Agents are now being sent out to check up on the situation.
