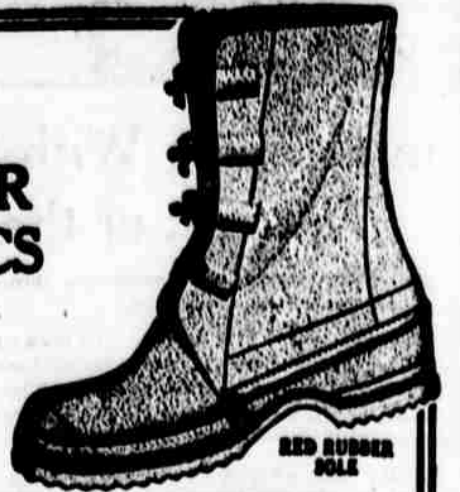

vital import trades," says the message.

Owing to the present accumulation of supplies at seaports and on freight cars throughout the country, due to the shortage of ocean tonnage, a forced slowdown in American factories until the ships are built, will be necessary, it is predicted.

"The situation," says Blackman, "is one in which not only the nation is vitally interested, but one which strikes at the very heart of labor itself. Interruptions to business and consequent loss of earnings to the employe will recur, or at least production will be retarded, with the same result, until we have shipping adequate to the task of clearing the port congestion."

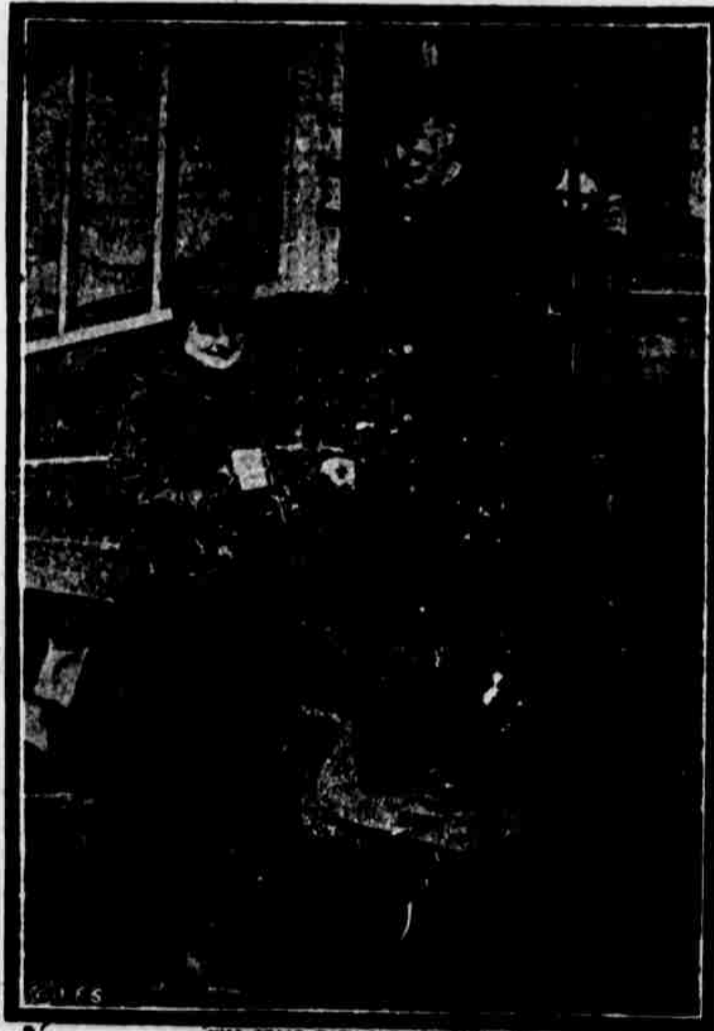
WEDDING YESTERDAY
