Shipyard Volunteers To Be Called Later

PORTLAND, Feb. 22.—Secretary of Labor Wilson has sent the following telegram to all state directors of the public service reserve for the purpose of clearing up some slight misunderstandings which have cropped out during the progress of the national "enrollment week" drive which now is on, for the registration of skilled workmen throughout the United States.

"The immense labor needs of the shipyards are comparatively filled and the man who leaves his present position to seek employment in a shipyard is likely to find no work.

"The coming weeks and months, however, will necessitate the increase of the present number of shipyard workers by several hundred thousand men, who have had experience in trades used in shipbuilding. The department of labor, with the aid of the shipping board council of national defense and the state councils of defense, now is enrolling in its United States public service men of these trades who are willing to go to the shipyard when they are advised of a place. The shipyard volunteers in the public service reserve will be placed thru the United States employment service of the department of labor, which will have full details as to when and where the men are needed, the wages and housing and other conditions.

"Membership in the reserve brings official recognition of the performance of, or the readiness to perform, a most necessary and patriotic service. It also protects both employers and workers, for it minimizes the drain on industry for the supplying of the shipyards and puts the wage earner where he can utilize to the fullest extent his ability and brain power. We appeal to all qualified men to enroll during the coming week in the reserve, and to stick to their present jobs until they are called."

BOATS GET 15 BRITISH

SHIPS DURING PAST WEEK

LONDON, Feb. 22.—British merchantmen sunk by mine or submarine in the past week numbered fifteen, according to the admiralty statement issued here. Of these, twelve were of 1,000 tons or over and three were under that tonnage. One fishing craft was also sunk.

The arrivals at ports in the United Kingdom for the week numbered 3,322, sailings, 2,393. Eight vessels were unsuccessfully attacked.

The sinkings for the past week show a slight diminution from the previous week, when nineteen merchantmen were sunk, thirteen of 1,000 tons or more, and six under that tonnage.

Norway Wants Imports From United States

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Jan. 28.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—How to come to an agreement with America for the resumption of the import supplies is the main topic for discussion by the Norwegian press and people. In the beginning the government did not seem to take the American question seriously. But after the failure of the commission in Washington to obtain export licenses, the cabinet members realized the gravity of the situation. One by one the members of the Norwegian delegation to Washington returned, until only Dr. Nansen remained.

The newspapers, except the official cabinet organ, are becoming impatient. They ask why Denmark has obtained export licenses for different food stuffs, and say Sweden has had greater success than Norway. So far, Germany has had great advantages from the trade agreements with Norway.

By the agreement with Great Britain of August, 1916, Norway could send 15 per cent of her fish to Germany. Besides this, Germany bought enormous quantities of canned fish, so that, it is said, the total export amounted to more than 30 per cent. It was asserted at a session of the storting that the total export of fish to Germany from August, 1914 to August, 1917, was 150,000 tons. Before the war the average export to Germany was 70,000 tons, or about 22 per cent of the whole export of fish from the country. On the other hand the Germans have not been able to keep their contract to furnish fishing tackle and motor oil as compensation for the fish.

One leading paper asks how long Norway is to continue supplying favors to Germany while the Germans sink Norwegian ships and kill Norwegian sailors. And, it inquired, what does Norway get in return for the material for manufacturing guns and ammunition which she is supplying to Germany.

Largest Costa Rica Volcano Now Active

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica, Jan. 25.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The Irazu Volcano, the largest and highest in Costa Rica, awakened and began a new period of violent activity after nearly two centuries of quietness.

The previous remarkable eruption of this volcano took place in 1723, when Costa Rica was the poorest of the colonies under the crown of Spain. During that year the Irazu was in activity throughout the whole year, emitting huge quantities of ashes, cinders, smoke, vapor and gasses, and the manifestation was followed by earthquakes. Then came a period of long rest. It fell into a deep slumber for nearly 200 years.

Now it has awakened again, and is pouring out, without interruption,

torrents of vapor, sublimates and ashes, cinders and volcanic debris, which, floating in the air and carried by air currents, have reached places 25 miles distant from the crater.

At the foot of this volcano lies the historical city of Cartage, three times destroyed by the colossus, and as often rebuilt by her inhabitants. During the present crisis Cartage has suffered no harm, as her inhabitants, wiser than experience, have rebuilt the city earthquake proof, and the emissions of the volcano have not reached Cartage, owing to the heavy winds prevailing and which have blown them towards the valley of San Jose. Thousands of persons have visited the summit of the mountain range to see the two oceans and the gigantic column of smoke and gasses aiming to the sky.

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—Paul Chapman, 16 years old, a former choir boy who was convicted of murder in the first degree for shooting to death two men during a robbery, was sentenced to death Tuesday in the electric chair.

at Sing Sing during the week of April 1st. Sentence was pronounced by Supreme Court Justice Kaplan of Brooklyn, who presided at the trial.

The youth maintained an attitude of stoical indifference, which has

characterized his actions since his arrest. "You got to die some time, anyway," commented the condemned youth when asked if he had anything to say. "I am not guilty of murder. I did not intend to commit murder."
