Drive On Pacific By Huns Is Suspected

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Military circles in Washington are not inclined entirely to discredit the theory that Germany's much heralded thrust on the western front is intended what is in reality to be a drive on America's interests in the Pacific.

In fact, it has been unofficially admitted the possibility of such a campaign is not being recognized for the first time, but that for some weeks suspicions have been entertained as to Berlin's motive in advertising the contemplated drive in the west.
