Gerald West and Kenneth Case climbed to the top of Stukel mountain Sunday afternoon, and reported about fifteen inches of snow at Triangulation Point.

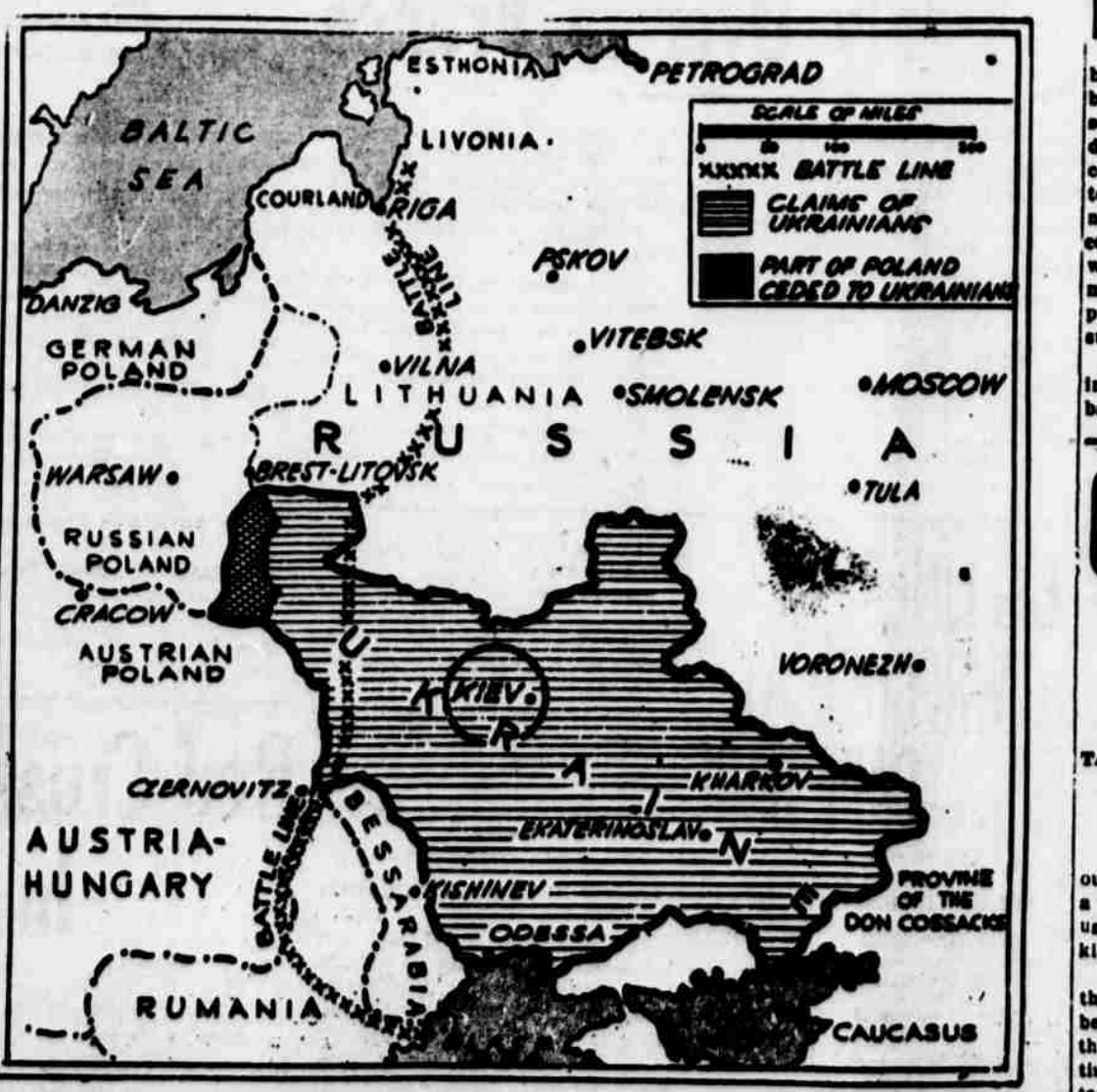
