HORSES AND MULES ARE NOW WANTED

ARMY OFFICERS TOUR CENTRAL OREGON BUYING ANIMALS FOR USE IN ARMY—GOOD PRICES BEING PAID

PORTLAND, Feb. 26.—Oregon is being scoured for available horseflesh for Uncle Sam's army. Captain F. S. von Stade and Lieutenant G. C. Weeks of the remount station at Fort Keeg, Mont., are on a tour of the central part of the state in quest of horses and mules. They will pay a flat rate of \$215 for mules and \$140 for cavalry horses.

Farmers and stockmen have been assured that there will be no red tape in obtaining payment for the horses and mules. Funds have been deposited in the Portland banks, and each owner will receive payment for his animal immediately.

The remount officers issued an appeal to ranchmen and others owning stock available for army use to offer their animals to the government.

"Horses are harder to train than men, and the government must have saddle broken and hardened beasts. Horses for army use must weigh 1,600 pounds or more and mules 1,200 or more. The government wishes to impress upon farmers and horse breeders the great immediate necessity for horses. A sacrifice is being asked of the farmers to let the government have their trained horses and to set to the task of breaking more colts."

The officers were in Prineville Thursday, Redmond Friday, Bend Saturday and Monday, en route to Lewiston, Idaho. Their Northwest headquarters are at the Portland hotel, Portland.

Wilson Fixes the Price of Wheat

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 25.—A price of \$2.20 a bushel—the same as for last year's crop—was fixed by President Wilson Saturday night for the coming season's wheat yield. The price is for No. 1 northern spring wheat at Chicago, with a scale of differentials for other markets.

The differentials differ to a slight extent from those now operative, and range from a minimum of \$2 to a maximum of \$2.25.

In fixing a price now for the new crop, which will not be harvested

until June, the president was believed to have had two objects in view. The first was to halt the legislation pending in congress to fix prices at from \$2.25 to \$3, and the other was to stimulate spring planting.

The introduction of the price raising bills had begun to check the flow of wheat to market, and food administration officials feared that mills soon would have to close down. Hoping the legislation would pass, farmers, it is declared, have been refusing to sell at the present price of \$2.20.

Uncle Sam to Buy Oregon Potatoes

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 26.—The quartermaster's department of the army has signed a contract for 600 tons of dehydrated potatoes from Oregon. This represents about 6,000 tons of fresh product.

Senator McNary, accompanied by P. N. Clark, representative of the Wittenberg-King interests, called to see Major McIntosh, head of the dried fruit and vegetable purchasing department of the army, and went over the situation with him, with the results stated. The price paid will mean 75 cents a hundredweight to the potato growers. Conditions elsewhere, Mayor McIntosh explained, have to be considered in making the price.

Senator McNary made a preliminary telegraphic canvass of the potato stocks on hand in Western Oregon. His advice indicate that about 20,000 tons of last year's crop are on hand. The government will thus take nearly one-third.

PORTLAND, Feb. 26.—An order for 600 tons of dehydrated potatoes to be furnished to feed American soldiers in France, the first given to an Oregon firm, has been received late by Wittenberg-King company of Portland.

The initial order, which is believed to be a forerunner of government orders for dehydrated products which will throw fresh Oregon potatoes and vegetables on the world market, will be valued at approximately \$250,000. Fully 6,000 tons of fresh potatoes will be purchased in Oregon to complete the order. The price of the po-

tatoes will be fixed by the government to protect the farmers of the state, under a ruling issued from Washington Friday. At the very low estimate the farmers will receive \$120,000 as a result of this order.

Another feature of the order is the assurance that the two plants of the company, located in Salem and The Dalles, will be run to full capacity for at least three months.
