CALIFORNIA CATTLE ARE BROUGHT IN

BEEF STOCK FROM SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA IS SHIPPED TO KLAMATH ON ACCOUNT OF SEVERE CONDITIONS - UNLOADED AT CHILOQUIN

Seven carloads of cattle from the drought stricken districts of Southern California have been shipped to Klamath County by Jack Pelton, a prominent stockman of the Fort Klamath district. They went thru to Chiloquin yesterday, and will be graded on the county ranges this coming season.

As the recent heavy rains in California have started the grass again, it is reported that it will not be necessary to move any more of the stock on account of the drought.
