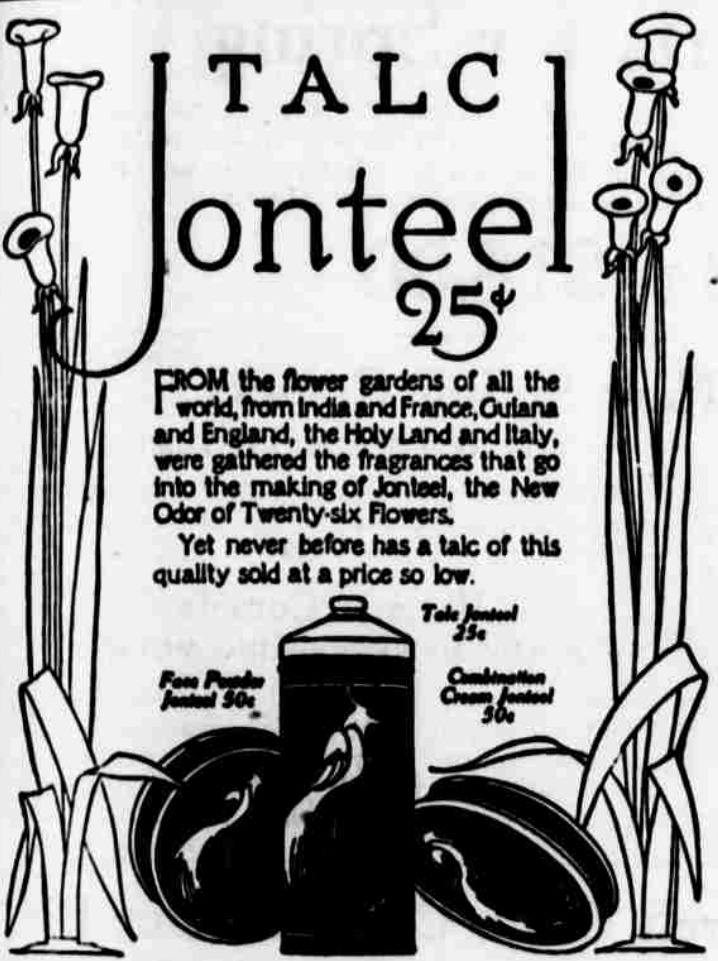

Irrigation In Modoc County Is Assured

ALTURAS, Calif., March 1.—Word has been received by W. H. Chase, secretary manager of the Northern California Counties' Association, from Congressman John E. Raker, removing all possible doubt as to the progress and future of the Rocky Prairie irrigation project in Modoc County.

At a recent meeting of the executive board of the association the secretary was instructed to communicate with Congressman Raker suggesting legislation or other procedure to remove the barrier of Indian allotments not subject to taxation which have held up the progress of this irrigation project for several years.

Congressman Raker feels confident that he can devise a plan to adjust this matter, and has asked for a map of the territory involved, which includes a vast area of arable and fertile land in this county heretofore utilized for grazing purposes only, but which will, when the new irrigation system is in operation, prove to be one of the big hay and grain producing sections of Northern California.

Many Texas Cities Soon to Be Dry

AUSTIN, Texas, March 1.—The Texas border will soon be dry. Bills establishing dry zones within a ten mile radius of all army camps and posts in the state will be introduced in the legislature as soon as the state lawmakers get down to business.

The fourth session was called Tuesday. Passage of the dry bill, it is believed, is assured, following the recommendations of Governor Hobbs.

It will make San Antonio, El Paso, Houston, Galveston, Fort Worth and many other smaller towns along the Rio Grande dry.

Patriotic Legion Is Started In Portland

PORTLAND, March 1.—A new loyalty league destined, according to its founders, to become nation wide in scope, was launched here recently when signers of the pledges of the American Patriotic Legion to adopt articles and elect officers. The pledge required of members makes them promise to do everything within their power to uphold and support the United States government, to put the interests of the government above all else, and to let no affiliation with political organization, church, fraternal or other organization swerve them in any degree from the perfect allegiance owed their country.

Grand Army veterans and United Confederate veterans are numbered among the officers, as are members of other patriotic organizations and some labor representatives. Lewis G. Garrigus of this city is originator and secretary of the legion.

The declared objects of the American Patriotic Legion are:

"To concentrate the thought and energy of all our people upon the task of successfully prosecuting the war in which we are engaged; to teach the people that sacrifice is indispensable to our success; to aid in fixing the status of individuals with reference to loyalty to the government; to bring to the consciousness of the people the understanding that the cause must be won else all that has been gained for civilization shall be sacrificed and the whole world be set back to the condition of the dark ages; and to do what it may by educational methods to prepare the people of this and other countries for the adjustments of the rights and responsibilities of the nations of the world to the end that the largest measure of individual liberty, consistent with the general good may be secured to all."

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 1.—The Federal Trade Commission on Investigator Francis J. Heney's recommendation has asked Congress for speedy special legislation to lay bare confidential files of the great packers and to disclose their alleged plans to take complete control of the meat industry.

OLD RESIDENT IS DEAD IN CALIFORNIA

DEATH OF KLAMATH PIONEER WHO HAD RESIDED IN CALIFORNIA FOR SOME TIME IS REPORTED BY RELATIVES

Word has just been received here of the death of Clinton Van Brimmer, a former prominent Klamath County resident, at his home in Arroyo Grande, San Luis Obispo County, Cal., on Sunday, January 13th, following an illness of three months due to chronic cystitis. He was 82 years of age, and is survived by his widow.

Mr. Van Brimmer came to Klamath County in 1866, and was identified with one of the first irrigation projects in this locality. The Van Brimmer ditch below Merrill still bears his name. The deceased crossed the plains in 1861, and lived in Blakely County at the time of the Modoc War. He was born in Delaware, Ohio.

Following his removal to California nine years ago, he secured extensive ranch interests, which he held at the time of his death.
