NEW CLUB STARTED IN CITY

WAR SAVINGS CLUB IS LAUNCHED
YESTERDAY WITH MEMBERS
PLEDGING TO SAVE CERTAIN
AMOUNT DAILY FOR THRIFT
STAMPS

An Oregon War Savings Club was launched here yesterday, and is now well under way. The members of this new body pledge themselves as loyal patriotic citizens of the United States to discourage the purchase of non-essentials and luxuries during the war period, and to invest a stated amount daily in Thrift Stamps and War Savings Stamps at 4 per cent interest, compounded quarterly.

Cards which have been forwarded from the state headquarters at Portland are signed by the members, and each one after signing his own name secures one new member, reporting the name of the new member on his pledge card, which he mails without postage to Portland.

It is declared that many people have long known the necessity of saving in order to become prosperous, but have been unable to make a good start. This new organization provides a systematic plan for saving and at the same time will assist the government to halt the Hun.

nish information regarding employees. This will be more fully explained in orders which are now on the press, and which will be issued within a few days.

"Please keep in mind that you are an officer of the treasury department of the United States, and if you were not you would be locked up on McNeill's Island for impersonating such an officer. We do not relish the notion that anyone is questioning your authority, and sincerely hope that you will have no occasion to report any insubordination. The work which we are in is the greatest task that the nation has ever faced. We are not playing horse. There is no lack of authority in yourself or those working under your direction or any failure of uniformity between the work which Klamath County and the other counties of the state are doing."
