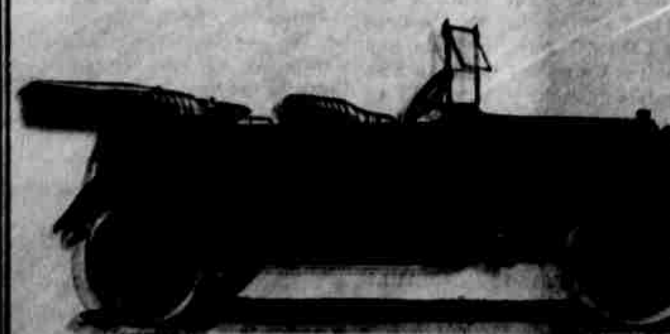

FACTS REGARDING KAISER'S
PRE-WAR ACTS, SHOWING
THAT FRANCE WAS FORCED
INTO CONFLICTPARIS, March 2.—Foreign Minister
Pichon has announced that just be-
fore the outbreak of the war Chan-
cellor von Bethman Hollweg informed
the government of France that if
that country decided to remain neu-
tral, Germany would require her to
hand over the French fortress of
Vordun Toul during a war with Rus-
sia. Pichon said this proved that
Germany deliberately rendered war
