

German Press Quiet On Food Situation

NEW YORK, March 8.—German newspapers of the first half of January recently received here have suspiciously little to say on the food situation, which for two years before was an important topic for discussion in practically all the Berlin newspapers. The coming political strike, evoked by food difficulties and the prospect of an indefinite prolongation of war through the attitude of the German delegates at Brest-Litovsk, was, perhaps, casting its shadow before and causing the censor to discourage publication of news calculated to augment the dissatisfaction of the working people.

A decree of the Prussian Commission on Food Administration mentioned however that mortality during recent months had been as high as 50 per cent above that of 1913, and for that reason, prescribed increased rations for tubercular patients, upon

whom the effects of undernutrition are felt with particular severity.

Food Director Waldow launched a fulmination against various offending municipalities, which were paying above the maximum prices for various kinds of food in order to assure a supply for their inhabitants and were thereby, he declared, contributing largely to the steady driving up of prices and to the disregard of the food laws.

The newspapers, none of which is a friend of the food dictator, retorted very sharply that it was impossible for the municipalities to secure food to feed their populations without disregarding the maxima, which is a general practice throughout Germany, and declared that Minister Waldow could find, if he sought for them, lawbreakers enough among the Prussian state offices and war food bureaus.

Resolution of the Common Council

Declaring its intention to improve Conger Avenue, and Fixing Date for Hearing Objections Thereof.

The city engineer, pursuant to resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having, under date of September 2, 1917, filed plans and specifications, and estimates of cost of improving Conger Avenue by paving same from Main street to the terminus of said Conger Avenue, including intersections, and the Council having taken same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory,

Be It Resolved, That said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Conger Avenue be and the same are hereby approved.

Be it further Resolved, That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said Conger Avenue in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates, said improvement to consist of paving said Conger Avenue with light bitulthite pavement, and the construction of storm sewers thereon, at the cost, as estimated by the city engineer, of the sum of \$28,765.50.

And be it further Resolved by the Common Council, That the property listed and described in "Schedule A," hereto attached and so designated, and made a part of this resolution, be and hereby is declared benefited by said improvement, and that said property as listed and described in said

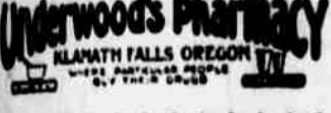


For the Sick Room

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Allies Must Hold On Says Man From Austria

ROME, Feb. 15.—(Correspondent of the Associated Press)—"The allies can win this war only by holding on, by the exertion of economic pressure on the central empires and by rigid economy at home," in the opinion of Dr. Massimo Pantaleoni of the Italian army, who has just been exchanged after twenty months as a prisoner in Austria and Hungary. Dr. Pantaleoni, altho Italian by birth, has many relatives in the United States.

"The secret of winning the war," said Dr. Pantaleoni, "remains in the blockade and in the allies at home exercising the greatest economy, but so organizing that economy in the way of limitation of consumption of foods and fuel and clothes that people will not be compelled to lose several hours of their time each day searching for coal, or bread, or such articles.

"It is like passing from darkness into daylight on leaving Austria, where the stores are empty of all useful articles. Cloth sells there at about the equivalent of \$24 a yard, where

leather shoes sell for 120 kronen the pair, where there is no sugar at all for sale, where the bread rate for the civil population is 2 1/2 ounces for each person per day, where the fat ration is one-quarter of an ounce, and where potatoes sell for 20 cents a pound, instead of 2 cents a pound before the war.

"In Austria mortality has increased very much since a year ago because of poor or no nourishment leading to rheumatism and dysentery, and when people die there are no coffins to bury them. Instead, their shrouds and good clothes are replaced by rags, and in these they are buried.

"Living conditions have not been improved by the taking of Rumania." While in Hungary attending Italian prisoners, who had been sent as far away as possible from the Isonzo front, so that they could not escape and go home, Rumanians told me civil conditions had been such in Rumania that the fields had not been worked, and therefore the crops had been poor."

Arizona Governor Knits For Soldiers

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 7.—Governor G. W. P. Hunt, sitting behind his mahogany desk in the executive office, placidly knitted and hummed as he received the newspaper men for their daily talk a few days ago here.

The interviewers watched the governor with surprise, and finally one of them ventured a query as to what he was doing.

"Just a minute," said the governor, "don't disturb me, or I'll drop a stitch."

"Yes," he continued, when he had filled the row he was working on, "I'll make a pair of socks for some soldier. I find it restful, as well as a way of doing my bit. I knit during my spare moments, particularly after I have been reading awhile.

"I used to knit when I was a boy. The fact is, the more sox and sweaters we turn out in Arizona, the less the burden on our knitting mills. If all of us here knitted, the Arizona soldiers would be assured an ample

supply of knitted things to wear." And the governor resumed his placid knitting.
