THIS MAN SHOULD "COME THRU" WITH INCOME TAX

SPOKANE, March 8.—Robert Carl Lewis turned in a questionnaire to a local exemption board stating that he was an "expert bank robber", that bank robbery had netted him \$10,000 for the past year and that he had registered at Medical Lake, Wash. Altho the Eastern Washing-

ton Hospital for the Criminal Insane is located at Medical Lake, the exemption board began an investigation as the questionnaire had been mailed in Arkansas.

A letter from the warden of the Arkansas state penitentiary advised the board that Lewis is a prisoner there, serving a three-year sentence for a robbery in Union county, Ark. Lewis registered at Medical Lake, June 5, last year and it was about that time a Medical Lake bank was robbed of \$14,000.
