BIG SHAKEUP
AMONG ARMY
OFFICERS

EIGHT MILITARY LEADERS RE-
LIEVED OF PRESENT COM-
MANDS AFTER BEING DECLAR-
ED PHYSICALLY UNFIT FOR
SERVICE ABROAD.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 14.—
Seven major-generals and one brig-
adier-general have been relieved from
their present commands, having been
found by medical boards unfit for
overseas service. In making this an-
nouncement General March, acting
chief of staff, said they have been
given assignments to duty in the U. S.,
reverting to their rank in the
regular army, and leaving the way
open for the appointment of new of-
ficers to command the fighting di-
visions.

The officers relieved of command
of guard and national army divisions
are:

Major General Edward Greble, 36
division (guard), Camp Bowie, Tex.

Major General Charles G. Morton,
29th division (guard), Camp McClel-
len, Ala.

Major General William H. Sage,
28th division (guard), Camp Shelby,
Miss.

Major General Thomas H. Barry,
36th division (national army), Camp
Grant, Ill.

Major General Edward H. Plummer,
38th division (national army),
Camp Dodge, Ia.

Major General William A. Mann,
commanding the department of the
east, reverts to the rank of brigadier
general and continues in his present
command.

Brigadier General Richard M. Blatch-
ford, now stationed at Panama, re-
verts to the rank of brigadier gen-
eral and is assigned to command the
department of Panama.

Brigadier General John S. Mallory,
stationed at Camp Green, N. C., re-
verts to his regular army rank of
colonel of infantry and is assigned
as executive officer of the infantry
replacement division at Camp Lee.
