This agreement made and entered into this 25th day of January, 1918, by and between the County Court of Klamath County, Oregon, party of the first part, and E. E. McClaran, Haughtaling and Dugan, parties of the second part,

Witnesseth: That the first party herein, for and in consideration of the services rendered and to be rendered upon the part of the second parties and the mutual promises and covenants herein contained, does hereby employ second parties to make, execute and design plans and specifications for a court house, work done for Klamath County, Oregon, to be located in Klamath Falls, Oregon;

In consideration thereof, the first party contracts and agrees to pay the second parties for such employment the sum of seven and one-half (7 1/2) per cent of the complete cost for the construction of such building; said compensation to be paid in the following manner, to-wit:

Five per cent of the amount due second party shall be paid when the plans and specifications are ready for the contractors and bids are received, and forty per cent additional shall be paid when the building is three-quarters completed, and the balance shall be paid when the building is fully completed.

In witness whereof, The first party has caused these presents to be executed by its commissioners and county judge by a resolution of the County Court duly made and entered of record, and the second parties have hereunto attached their hands and seals this 25th day of January, 1918.
