ASHLAND TO HAVE STATE MILITIA

ASHLAND, March 15.—While in Ashland the other day Sheriff Ralph Jennings gave out the information that a state militia company of 65 members had been recommended for Ashland and could be organized as soon as proper authority is received from the office of Adjutant General Williams at Salem. The militia will supersede the home guards and have regular army equipment. Men between the ages of 16 and 45 will be eligible for membership, service to be altogether within the state.
