Congress to Cooperate With Administration

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16.—The administration has formally embarked on a policy of taking Congress completely into its confidence, as to the progress of war preparations and developments on the fighting front in Europe. At the invitation of Acting Secretary of War Crowell, members of the Senate military committee

were in session at the war department for nearly two hours Tuesday with the full membership of the war council, and beginning next week will meet with that body every Saturday morning.

Probably a large room will be obtained later so that the committees of both houses may be received in joint session.

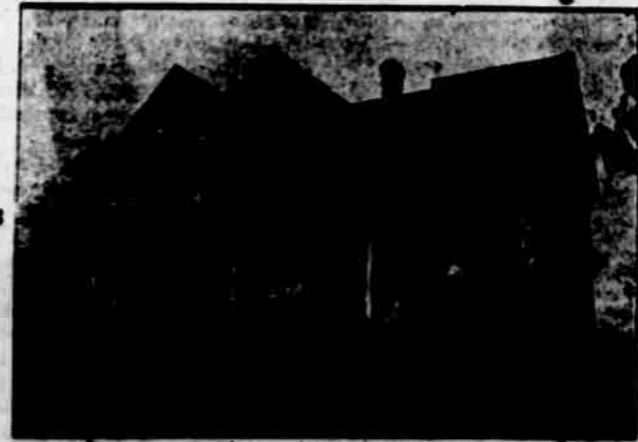

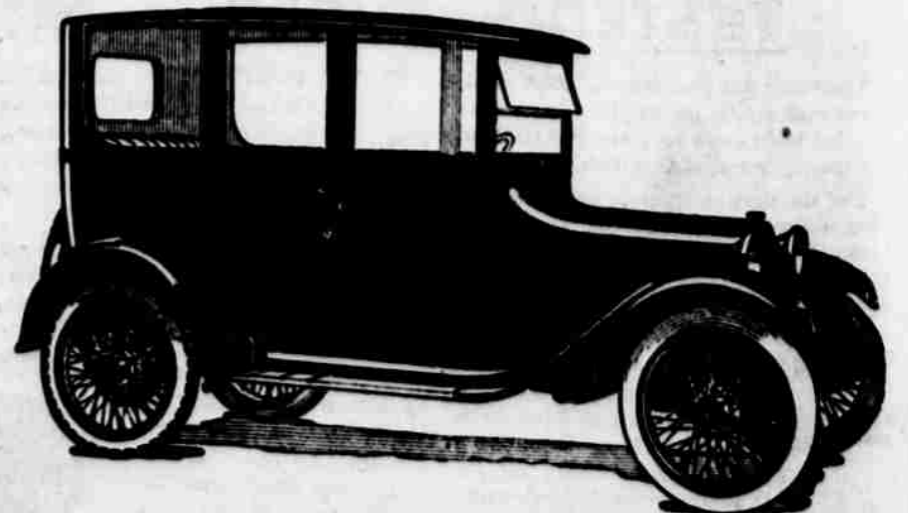
