Biggest W. S. Stamp Day Totals \$3,000,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 15.—The war savings campaign has reached its first \$3,000,000 day, as shown by the report of receipts by the Treasury Department.

Three millions a day from the thrift stamps provides the Treasury with about one-tenth of the entire amount now being expended by the Nation for the war. While \$3,000,000 is only 3 cents a day for every man, woman and child in the country, the entire cost of the war is only 30 cents per capita a day.

The National War-Savings Committee, delegated by the Treasury to enlist 100,000,000 investors in the "baby bonds," anticipates soon reaching the \$5,000,000 a day rate necessary to place the \$2,000,000,000 issue within a year. This will be six cents a day per capita.

The sale of these stamps will finance the Government's entire emergency shipping program. The current Treasury receipts from their sale are already averaging the cost of building 12,000 tons of shipping a day.

Call Is Made For Carpenters' Mates

PORTLAND, Or., March 15.—Carpenters' mates for the naval aviation according to word received from branch are needed by the government. Washington by Commander E. F. Eckhart of the local navy recruiting station.

"High-class men are desired. Concentrate recruiting on this rating until further orders," says the message. These men are to be between the

ages of 18 and 35 and those who desire may be sent immediately to the East coast for duty at once in France at the United States navy air base. The men will be given ratings according to their skill and experience as woodworkers. Men in this service if qualified by experience and training, may secure commissions as warrant officers from the secretary of the navy.

Building Trades Council Meeting In California

VISALIA, Cal., March 15.—Nearly 500 delegates representing almost every skilled trade in California were present here today for the opening of the eighteenth annual convention of the State Building Trades Council which will continue its sessions through the week.

Patriotism is the keynote, and the opening address by P. H. McCarty of San Francisco, president of the council, was devoted almost in its entirety to the war situation and the part that labor in California has played in the struggle against autocracy. Important discussions will be held

during the week for the purpose of formulating plans for the better organization of the trades council and many thousand affiliated members for the unreserved prosecution of the war.

Elaborate preparations have been made for the entertainment of the delegates in which all of Tulare county has assisted. Several banquets have been arranged as well as dances and automobile trips thru the surrounding country.

Interest was focused today on the annual report of President P. H. McCarty. Tomorrow, Olaf A. Trivette, Secretary will read his report

of the Oregon legislature for the year.

George W. Weens, who has been a member of the lower house for several sessions, filed his declaration of candidacy for the Republican nomination in Marion county. His slogan is "A farmer candidate."

FEAR BLIGHT TROUBLES ROGUE RIVER ORCHARDISTS

ROSEBURG, Or., March 15.—Fear blight still is the chief horticultural problem of the Rogue River valley, according to Jackson county blight experts. There are three county experts, each responsible for about 10,000 acres of orchards. Rigid inspections of trees are made and owners are required to cut out any new infections discovered.

NOTICE OF FILING PETITION FOR INCLUSION OF LAND WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE WILLOW VALLEY IRRIGATION DISTRICT.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on the 5th day of March, A. D. 1918, there was filed with the Board of Directors of the Willow Valley Irrigation District of Klamath County, Oregon, petitions signed by R. P. Young, William C. Edler and R. P. Young, who are holders of this representing a majority of the owners of a body of land adjacent to the boundaries of the Willow Valley Irrigation District, which said petitions are in writing and acknowledged by the petitioners as required by law after described land be included in the boundaries of the Willow Valley Irrigation District, to wit:

Commencing at the Northwest corner of the Southeast quarter of Section 32 in Township 40 South, Range 14 East of the Willamette Meridian; thence west a distance of one-half mile, more or less, to the center of said Section 32, said Township and Range; thence South, one-half mile more or less, to the Township line between Townships 40 and 41 South, Range 14 East of the Willamette Meridian; thence East one-half mile more or less to the Southeast corner of Section 32; thence South one-half mile, more or less, to the quarter corner on the section line between Sections 32 and 33 in said Township and Range, being the point of beginning;

Also, commencing at the southwest corner of the SW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 29, in Township 40 South, Range 14 East of the Willamette Meridian; thence East one-half mile more or less, to the section line between Sections 29 and 31, in said Township and Range; thence South a distance of one-quarter of a mile, more or less, to the Northwest corner of Section 31 in said Township and Range; thence East a distance of one-quarter of a mile, more or less, to the Southwest corner of the NW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 32, in said Township and Range; thence East, three-quarters of a mile, more or less, to the Southwest corner of the NW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 32, in said Township and Range; thence North a distance of one-quarter of a mile, more or less, to the section line between Sections 32 and 33 in said Township and Range; thence West a distance of one-quarter of a mile, more or less, to the Southwest corner of the NW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 32, in said Township and Range; thence North a distance of one-quarter of a mile, more or less, to the point of beginning.

Also, commencing at the southeast corner between Sections 30 and 32, in Township 40 South, Range 14 East of the Willamette Meridian; thence West one-quarter of a mile, more or less, to the Southwest corner of the NW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 30, in said Township and Range; thence South one-half mile, more or less, to the Township line between Townships 40 South and 41 South, Range 14 East of the Willamette Meridian; thence East along said Township line, one-quarter of a mile, more or less, to the Southwest corner of said Section 30 in Township 40 South, Range 14 East of the Willamette Meridian; thence North one-half mile, more or less to the place of beginning.
