# "THE SLACKER" Hun Chancellor Says Russ Treaty is Fair

**The Wonderplay, at Orpheus Theater Tonight, Shows All Nationalities**

Of vital interest to every American, whether of native or foreign parentage, is "The Slacker," Metro's great seven-act production to be seen at the Orpheus on March 21 and 22. Descendants of all nations are represented in this patriotic photodrama, which has been written and directed by that wizard of the screen, William Christy Cabanne. In turn we are shown Frenchmen, Italians, Englishmen, Roumanians, Chinese, Japanese, etc., and then these, massed together, dissolve into one huge American flag, flying free—the true "melting pot" of the nations. The same universal spirit of patriotism is illustrated in the story of the production. Native born Americans hasten to enlist in army and navy and "do their bit." A Chinaman, born here, offers his life to the country. A German lad, born abroad, decides to cast his lot with the land of his adoption. In one scene 3,000 soldiers, with fixed bayonets, advance in a formidable mass to answer the call of Columbia.

COPENHAGEN, March 21.—Chancellor von Hertling, on the first reading in the reichstag of the peace treaty with Russia, declared that he did not wish to discuss the opinions of Germany's enemies regarding the treaty. He said:

"Hypocrisy has become second nature to the enemy, whose untruthfulness is made worse by its brutality. Every attempt at calm explanation and every real deliberation must fail when the enemy at the very moment they are laying a heavy hand on a neutral country, dare to speak of a policy guided by complete unselfishness.

"The treaty with Russia contains no conditions disgraceful to Russia, if the provinces breaking away from Russia say it is in accordance with their own wish, and the wish is accepted by Russia."

The imperial chancellor declared that Courland and Lithuania were united to Germany politically and economically and militarily, and added:

"Livonia and Estonia are the eastern frontier fixed by the treaty, but we hope that they also will have a close and friendly relation with Germany, not, however, to the exclusion of their friendly relations with Russia. Poland is not mentioned in the treaty, and we shall endeavor to see if it is possible to live in stable and good neighborly relations with the new state.

"If the reichstag adopts the peace treaty, peace on the whole eastern front will be restored, as I announced February 24th, but among the entente powers there is not the least inclination to finish this terrible war. The responsibility for bloodshed will be upon the heads of those who wish continuation of the bloodshed."

The chancellor referred to Russia's proposal that all the belligerents enter into the peace negotiations, and added:

"We and our allies accepted the proposals, and sent delegates to Brest-Litovsk. The powers until then allied with Russia remained aloof.

"The course of the negotiations is known to you. You remember the endless speeches which were intended, not so much for the delegates there assembled, as for the public at large, and which caused the desired goal of an understanding to recede into the distance. You remember the repeated interruptions, the rupture and the resumption of the negotiations. The point had been reached where 'yes' or 'no' had to be said, and on March 3 peace was concluded at Brest-Litovsk. On March 16 it was ratified by a competent assembly at Moscow."

## Big Figures of Fight Game Who Have Died in the Past Few Months



Six important characters of the pugilistic game, men whose names were long known over the whole world where a fight was enjoyed, have passed away within the past few months. The death of Bob Fitzsimmons, champion of the world, was followed by that of Bob Vernon, who sold champions, but spent most of his profits backing and encouraging fighters. He made possible the match in London between Freddie Welsh and Willie Ritchie, by which the former won the lightweight championship. Charley White, perhaps the greatest of referees of Queensbury rules days, was another victim. John L. Sullivan, the most popular fighter the ring has known, died this year. Billy Madden, manager of many champions, the man who made John L. Sullivan famous on the tour in which Sullivan offered \$500 to the man who could stay four rounds with him, followed his old fighters quickly. The last to go was Terry McGovern, "Terrible Terry," a little fellow, but a fury of the Sullivan kind.

Whereas the Common Council has heretofore by resolution deemed expedient and necessary the construction of the sewer hereinafter described, and has required from the city engineer plans and specifications therefor, with all necessary catch basins, man holes, lampholes and branches, and estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, and the city engineer having filed in the office of the police judge the plans, specifications and estimates so required, and,

Whereas, The Common Council finds said plans, specifications and estimates so filed to be satisfactory;

Be it Resolved, That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to construct, at an estimated cost of one thousand one hundred ninety (\$1,190.00) dollars, the sewer (together with all necessary catch basins, manholes, lampholes and branches) described and located as follows:

Beginning at the intersection (center of the intersection) of Delta street and the alley separating Fairview Addition No. 1 from Fairview Addition No. 2; thence south thru the center of said alley to Upham street; thence to the manhole at intersection of Prospect and Upham streets.

Be it further Resolved, That the plans, specifications and estimates for said sewer as filed by the city engineer be and the same are hereby approved.

Be it further Resolved, That the property described as follows will be benefited by the construction of said sewer, and that said property be assessed for one-half the cost of said sewer in the sum set opposite each lot and parcel, said respective sums being the portion of the estimated cost of said sewer allotted and determined to each lot and parcel by the Common Council, to-wit:

**NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC**

The ordinance providing for uniform system of numbering has passed the council.

Under authority of the ordinance Mr. R. L. Griffith, postman, has been appointed to carry out its provisions. The action of the Council was made necessary by reason of the confusion of numbering in portions of the city already numbered, and the lack of numbering in some of the additions.

The numbering and re-numbering is to be completed by April 1, 1918, and is now under way. The work can be greatly facilitated by co-operation of the citizens, and it is to be hoped that their aid will be forthcoming, as it is a matter of considerable importance in more ways than one.

Mr. Griffith will carry with him a copy of the ordinance duly certified, and be prepared to furnish any information in connection with the numbering or re-numbering of houses and places of business.

The ordinance provides that a number shall be applied to every 1 1/2 feet of frontage, except in a few instances, where property has not been subdivided into lot subdivisions, and between the river and First street on Main and streets parallel thereto.

The numbering on cross streets shall begin northerly and southerly from Main street, and shall be designated in addresses as north and south, First, Second, Third, etc., as the case may be.

The numbering of Fairview Additions One and Two starts at Upham street, with 1200 and 1201, and running north, and from the west line of the cemetery with 700 running west.

Michigan avenue numbering starts at Main street with 100 and 101 for the first 225 feet, and so on to Wall street. Starting again at Wall street with 200 and 201 and continue.

Numbering on Pacific Terrace begins at Erie street with 400 and 401, and runs northwesterly. All blocks on streets parallel with Pacific Terrace to carry same 100 numbers as on Pacific Terrace.

Numbering on Esplanade begins at Main street with 1200 and 1201, continuing to Michigan avenue. Starting again at Michigan avenue with 1600 and 1601 and continuing to Eldorado. Starting again at Eldorado with 1700 and 1701 and so on to Earl, and starting again at Earl with 1800 and 1801.

Portland street begins numbering at Crescent, starting with 1300 and 1301 for first 225 feet, 1400 and 1401 and so on for balance of first block.

On streets running north from Eleventh street, north from the canal, and starting with 1100 and 1101, and so on to Nelson street. Starting again at Nelson street with 1200 and 1201 for all streets running north for the first block and 1300 and 1301 for next block, and so on.

In Mills Addition, streets running at right angles to Front street begin numbering at Front street with 2000 and 2001.

On streets running at right angles with Home avenue, numbering begins at Home avenue with 500 and 501, and so on.

Conger avenue begins numbering at Main with 100 and 101 for the first 225 feet, 200 and 201 for second 225 feet, and so on to end of avenue.

California avenue begins numbering at Conger with 600 and 601 for first block, 700 and 701 for second block, and so on.

South Riverside begins numbering at West Main with 100 and 101 for first 225 feet, 200 and 201 for second 225 feet, and so on.

West Main street begins numbering at River with 100 and 101 for first block, and so on.

Cyrus avenue begins numbering at West Main with 300 and 301, and so on.

Buildings on the north or east sides of streets shall bear odd numbers, and buildings on the south and west sides shall bear even numbers.
