Launching First Steel Ship Built on Gulf of Mexico



New Orleans and the whole Mexican gulf coast rejoiced the other day when the first steel ship ever built on the whole line of the gulf coast was launched into Lake Borgne Canal at Violet, La. The Mexoll is a 3,000 ton vessel built by the Alabama & New Orleans Transportation company for the Mexican Petroleum company. The South, which has never gone in for ship building, has awakened over this event, and it has been hailed as a historic occasion.

List of Drives On West Front

Here are dates and figures showing when and where both sides have previously tried and failed to break thru on the west front:

February, 1915—British at Neuve Chapelle; advanced one mile on two-mile front, then were stopped.

April, 1915—Germans at Ypres—First gas attack; net result advance of three miles at certain points of the line. Advance then stopped.

May and June, 1915—French in Artois; they took villages, thousands of prisoners, captured Lorette Height and almost cleared Vimy Ridge. Then their advance was stopped.

September, 1915—British and French in Artois and Champagne. French advanced over 18 miles front; took 25,000 prisoners, 100 guns; were checked at third line. British at Loos lost 50,000 men, gained a few square miles of devastated territory, then were stopped.

February, 1916—Germans at Verdun; gained nearly five miles in six days; advanced little over one mile in succeeding six months; then were swept back; lost 500,000 men.

July, 1916—British and French on the Somme advanced six miles in six months; British lost 50,000 in killed first day. Net result, release of 1,000 square miles of French soil, Germans forced to retreat from Arras to Noyon.

April, 1917—French and British above Alsace and at Arras, respectively. French made local gains; British were stopped five miles from starting point.

Summer 1917—British at Ypres gained six miles in four months, wiped out Ypres salient; won most of Paschendaele ridge, then were stopped.

March, 1918—Germans on west front—will the history of offensives repeat itself?

RED CROSS GOODS GIVEN GOOD CARE

GOVERNMENT ISSUES ORDERS CALLING FOR INVENTORY OF GOODS, DECLARING THAT R. C. GARMENTS RECEIVE CAREFUL ATTENTION

SEATTLE, Wash., March 25.—According to advice received by C. D. Stimson, manager of the Northwest Division of the American Red Cross, from the War Council at Washington, an order has been issued under date of March 11th by the adjutant general of the army, addressed to all commanding generals and all department commanders, instructing them to have an inventory taken immediately of all articles of wearing apparel issued by the Red Cross, and requiring the unit supply officers to take up and return and account for these articles as they were government property regularly supplied by the quartermaster's corps.

Furthermore, they are to exercise the same care in their use and preservation, and are to turn them into the quartermaster for renovation at the end of the season, or when no longer required, to be re-issued when needed. This is in order to protect from moth and damage in other forms during the summer months all Red

Cross sweaters and other knitted articles furnished to soldiers. This action on the part of the war department will assure thousands of American women who have knitted sweaters and other articles for soldiers for winter use that the articles which they have made are to receive the same careful attention as clothing or any other article furnished by the government.
