British Airmen Raid
Cities of the EnemyLONDON, March 28.—British avi-
ators have bombed the railway station
at Cologne, as well as various other
important cities in Germany, the of-
ficial statement on aerial operations an-
nounces.The text of the statement follows:
"During Sunday night one of the
enemy's large bombing machines
landed behind our lines. Following a
successful daylight raid on Mannheim
other objectives in Germany were at-
tacked during the night."Half a ton of bombs were dropped
on the railway stations at Cologne,
where a fire was started. Over a ton
of bombs were distributed between
the Luxemburg railway station, where
a fire broke out, and the Courcelles
railway station, east of Metz. Two
tons of bombs were dropped on the
Metz railway station."The fight was the most severe so
far experienced. Our airplanes shot
down forty-five enemy machines and
drove twenty-two out of control. Two
other hostile machines were shot
down by our anti-aircraft guns. Ten
of our machines are missing."Over 1700 bombs were dropped
during the day on different targets,
including the Bruges docks, the Aul-
noye railway station, and a large
camp southeast of Cambrai."Lodge to Attend

SUCCESSFULBRITISH RECAPTURE TWO
POINTS, ACCORDING TO LON-
DON REPORTS—FRENCH HARD

MENTS ARRIVINGLONDON, March 28.—The British
delivered a counter attack yesterday
between the angle of Ancre and the
Somme rivers, and recaptured More-
land Court and Chitilly, according to
an announcement by the war office.
The Germans hold the town of
Albert and the British hold the rail-
way embankment on the outskirts ofthe town. The Germans are now
massing their forces for an attack
here.
The French have been heavily en-
gaged to the west of Roye, and forced
to give ground, but reinforcements
are now arriving.
