Special Easter services are being planned among the Klamath Falls churches tomorrow, and in view of the beautiful spring weather now present, it is expected that a record attendance will be made.

The Knights Templars will worship in a body at the Eleventh street Baptist church, at which a special pro- gram will be given with a sermon by the Rev. W. H. Cox. Special services will also be given by the Sunday school and the B. Y. P. U., to which the public is invited. Subject of the morning service will be "The Resur- rection."

"Easter's Supreme Message to the World" is the title of the sermon an- nounced by Rev. E. P. Lawrence of the First Presbyterian church, at which a beautiful Easter program will be given. A special program on the life of the nations has been ar- ranged for the Sunday school, at which the Sunday school of Mt. Laki plans to visit in a body and partici- pate. Twenty numbers are announ- ced for the program at this time.

"What Shall We Do in Heaven" is the subject for the evening service, which will be held at 8:30 on the new schedule for this Sunday only.

Easter services are announced at the Church of the Sacred Heart, with Episcopal Mass at 9:30, new time, High Mass at 1:30, new time, and evening service at 8 o'clock, new time, by Father Hugh Marshall, pas- tor.

The Evangelical Lutheran services will be held in the Baptist church, corner of Eighth and Washington streets, at 7 p. m., with Sunday school at 2 p. m.

"The Resurrection of Jesus Christ" will be the subject of the sermon preached by the Rev. M. C. Rossman, to which all Klamath Falls Lutherans are especially invited.

Sunday school will be held at the library hall by the Episcopal Guild at 10:30, old time. This congregation will hold no other service tomorrow.

Rev. G. O. Oliver at the Methodist church will talk on the "Message of Easter for the Twentieth Century" at the morning service. In the evening a special Easter program will be given by the children of the Sunday school.

There is no foundation for the alleged violations of law attributed to our Com- pany by agents of the Federal Trade Commission and I want to say emphati- cally that Swift &amp; Company is not a party to any conspiracy to defraud the Govern- ment. Conferences of packers, where prices have been discussed, have been held at the urgent request and in the presence of representatives of either the Food Administration or the Council of National Defense. And yet the packers have been accused of committing a felony by acting in collusion on Government bids!

We have done our best, with other packers, large and small, to comply with the directions of the United States Food Administration in all particulars, including the furnishing of food supplies for the U. S. Army and Navy and the Allies, now be- ing handled through the Food Adminis- tration.

We will continue to do our utmost, un- der Government direction, to increase our production and assist the Food Adminis- tration. We consider that the opportunity to co-operate whole-heartedly and to our fullest powers with this branch of the Government is our plain and most press- ing duty.

The Trade Commission Attorney has, by false inference and misplaced empha- sis, given to disconnected portions of the correspondence taken from our private files and read into the Record, a false and sinister meaning with the plain purpose of creating antagonistic public opinion.

The services of the packers of the United States are most urgently needed, and I regret exceedingly that we should at this time have to spend our efforts in defending ourselves against unfounded, unproved, and unfair assertions such as are being daily made public.
