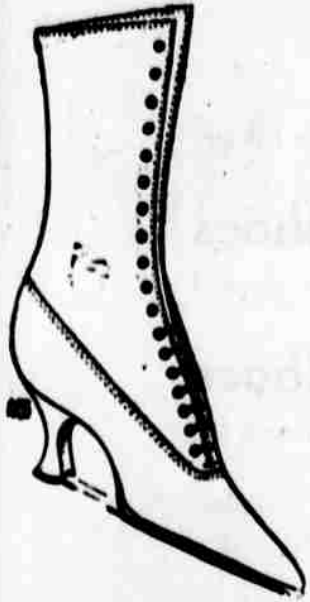

Germans Are Unable To Force Decision

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 3.—Germany has staked its fortunes on the spring campaign, says the war department's weekly review of the military situation, and the allies and the United States must be prepared for fresh attacks at new points if the Teutons fail to achieve victory in the present fighting.

"As the German higher command," continues the statement, "is apparently determined to force a decision or prove to its own satisfaction that it is unable to do so, we must be prepared in case of failure to obtain major results in the present theater of operations, as it will attempt further offensive assaults in adjacent areas."

"But, despite the successes gained by the Germans," says the review,

"the enemy has been unable to force a decision, and so long as the allies are able to maneuver with the consistent unity and flexibility which they have shown during the engagements of the last week, so long will victory elude the enemy."

The placing of American resources unreservedly at the disposition of the allies is noted, and the statement announces that "such of our troops as have received sufficient training will assume a share of the burden now so valiantly borne by the French and the British armies."

The review also mentions that American troops are taking their places in other parts of the line, thus relieving veteran French units for emergency service.

Industrial Workers Tried At Chicago

CHICAGO, April 3.—Leaders and organizers of the Industrial Workers of the World, more than 100 in number, have entered pleas of not guilty at the opening of the trial in which the government will attempt to prove that the defendants violated the espionage act, plotted to destroy industries and conspired to hamper prosecution of the war.

With but one exception all of the 112 defendants were in court when Federal Judge Landis ordered their names called for formal pleading. Albert Kimball, who was out on bail, was reported seriously ill.

Poets, lumberjacks and political writers and ship workers were among the defendants, who, manacled and heavily guarded, were brought into

the court room in groups of ten. Their raiment, including overalls, flowing ties and fancy waistcoats, revealed crowds of spectators, only a few of whom gained entrance to the court room. Former associates of the defendants staged striking reunions, some falling into embraces.

George F. Vanderveer, chief counsel for the defense, said that witnesses had been called by the defense from all parts of the country, with a view to proving that the I. W. W. is simply an organization of workers. The defense will attempt to show by these witnesses that while the organization feels that the present political system is too slow for industrial and social reforms, there has been no attempt to cripple industry or block war plans.
