Time Thought Ripe For Counter Offensive

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 5.—
With the battle of Picardy brought
to a standstill for the time being, at
least, and the initial momentum of
the German drive overcome, military
observers here are plainly puzzled by
the fact that a great counter attack
has not developed.

OFFICIALS RECOMMEND
CAPTAIN'S REMOVAL

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—Federal
officials have recommended to
Washington the immediate removal
of Captain R. J. Poulsen as deputy to
the United States inspectors of hulls
and boilers at Seattle. The recom-
mendation was given as the result of
the testimony which he gave at the
trial of the Hindus, charged with
conspiring against the British rule in
India. Poulsen was captain of the
steamer Masatlan, which, it is al-
leged, transferred coal to the German
cruiser Leipzig at sea in 1914.

RUSSIAN DELEGATION
SENT TO AMERICA

LONDON, April 5.—The Russian
government is sending a delegation
to the United States to liquidate Rus-
sia's war orders with American firms
and to arrange for future trade re-
lations.

Officers here frankly admit, how-

inclined to look elsewhere for the ag-
gressive campaign to which they are
pinning their faith. They have count-
ed upon creation of a unified army
under General Foch to produce offen-
sive operations, and they see nothing
in the situation at the present time
to warrant the rumor that the allies
have not the necessary forces or sup-
plies.
