U. S. AIRMEN MORE DARING THAN ITALIANS

WILL NOT TAKE AS MANY RISKS IN AIR AS AMERICAN FLYERS. IT IS REPORTED, WRITES BILLY WEEKS, NOW IN ACTIVE SERVICE

That the Italians will not take as many risks in the air as the Americans, and that the types of machines which they use in training are much slower and safer, is some of the information contained in a letter sent to his father by Sergeant Billy Weeks.

The letter, in part, is as follows: "You can't imagine how much I appreciate a letter from you folks. I may come back at noon, after a morning's work in cold, drizzly, miserable weather, feeling blue and disconsolate, and find a letter lying on my bunk from home. Then, lo and behold, the outlook is different. I eat a good dinner, and go back to work with renewed energy and more optimistic thoughts. So take heed, if you want to keep me in good spirits and with lots of pep, write often."

"It is just now 1 p. m., and at 1:25 we turn out for inspection and muster for pay day. Right at this moment the rain is pattering down very

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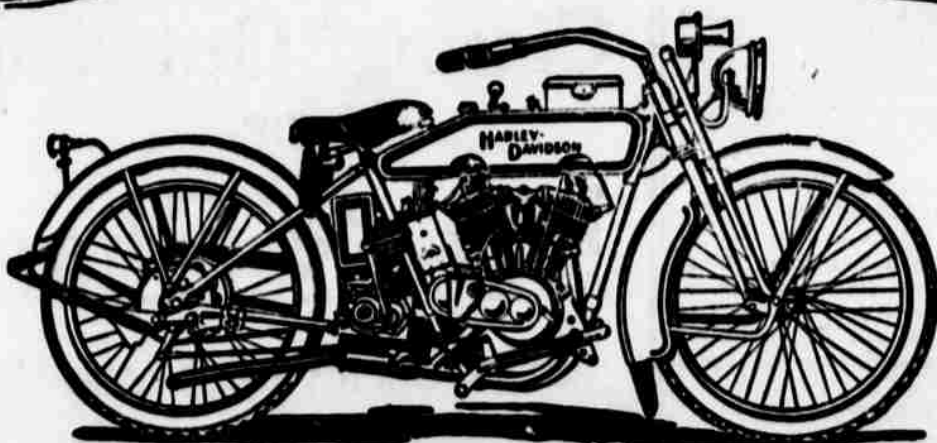
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
