# Good Results Shown In Red Cross Report

Quarterly report of board of managers submitted to executive committee at last meeting, March 30; To the Executive Committee, Klamath Chapter, A. R. C.:

Ladies and Gentlemen—Speaking in behalf of the board of managers, I have the following activities to report for the last quarter:

The work room has been open every day and well supplied with materials; the outside districts, Mallin, Bonanza, Bly, Lorella, Mt. Laki, Henley School, Fort Klamath, Klamath Agency and Algoma, are responding most effectively to our petitions for assistance; the volume of supplies shipped has been quite satisfactory, as the following will show, and you will note quite an increase for this quarter over last quarter.

Pajamas—Last quarter, 285; this quarter, 520; total to date, 805.  
Nightgales—Last quarter, 120; this quarter, 44; total to date, 164.  
Bed socks—Last quarter 15.  
Christmas Presents—Last quarter 256.

Knitted Sweaters—Last quarter, 55; this quarter, 275; total to date, 330.

Knitted Sox—Last quarter, 80; this quarter, 259; total to date 339.

Knitted Mufflers—Last quarter, 16; this quarter, 8; total to date, 24.

Knitted Wristlets—Last quarter 25; this quarter, 18; total to date, 43.

Knitted Afghans—This quarter, 5.

Hospital Bed Shirts—This quarter, 20.

Hospital Surgical Wipes—This quarter, 240.

Hospital Surgical Pillows—This quarter, 13.

Hospital Surgical Dressings—This quarter, 5,000.

Totals—For last quarter, 862; this quarter, 6,402. Grand total to date, 7,262.

Mrs. Addie Walker, who has been such an ardent worker, finds that she needs a rest, and is unable to continue in charge of the work room, a circumstance which is very much to be regretted, and we wish to extend to her our sincere thanks for her past efforts. Mrs. Sullivan has consented to take temporary charge of the work room. A plan has been evolved to have one lady act as hostess each afternoon to greet and welcome all who come to work. The hostess will be selected by the Woman's Relief Corps.

The surgical dressings department, under the leadership of Mrs. C. F. Stone, was just starting at the end of last quarter. It is now well under way and doing wonderful work, as the large volume of supplies shipped attests. In connection with this department, Mrs. Stone conducts a class of instruction in making surgical dressings twice each week at the Baldwin hotel.

The Junior Red Cross has grown from nothing at the beginning of this quarter to a membership of 1,500, which is a remarkable showing, in view of the fact that the total registration of eligible pupils in the county is 2,000. Besides the branches of this organization in Klamath Falls, there are 31 auxiliaries. The Junior Red Cross has collected approximately \$500 for their own use. Of this amount approximately \$150 was contributed by the high school, \$150 by the grade schools and about \$200 by the county schools. The Junior Red Cross has been assigned a number of layettes to be made for Belgian children. The officers of this organization are: Mr. Bowman chairman, Miss Edna Wells secretary, Mr. Hayden treasurer, Mr. Dunbar, Miss Mears and Mr. Lincoln directors.

The officers and directors meet every Friday night, and are indeed deeply interested in the work. Entertainments have been given all over the county for the Red Cross and a number of contributed articles have been raffled. All of which have contributed very gratifying sums, as the report of the treasurer will show. The engagement of Sergeant Wells to bring us a real message from the front, met with a very hearty response, and made us feel more keenly the need of war work. Ten places have been petitioned to

establish auxiliaries. Two, Main and Lorella, have established them, and Fort Klamath and Bonanza have applied, and others have signified their intention to do so as soon as the roads clear up so that meetings can be held frequently. Yainax does not at this time feel able to establish an auxiliary, but gave an entertainment and secured forty-six members, mostly Indians. Algoma has begun sewing and knitting work, under the leadership of Mrs. Matt Egan.

The appeals which we have received for additional supplies, in view of our ever-increasing army and the seriousness of the war outlook, should prompt us to double or treble our efforts for the coming quarter, and we sincerely hope that every woman in Klamath who can sew or knit or make bandages will respond to the need of the hour.

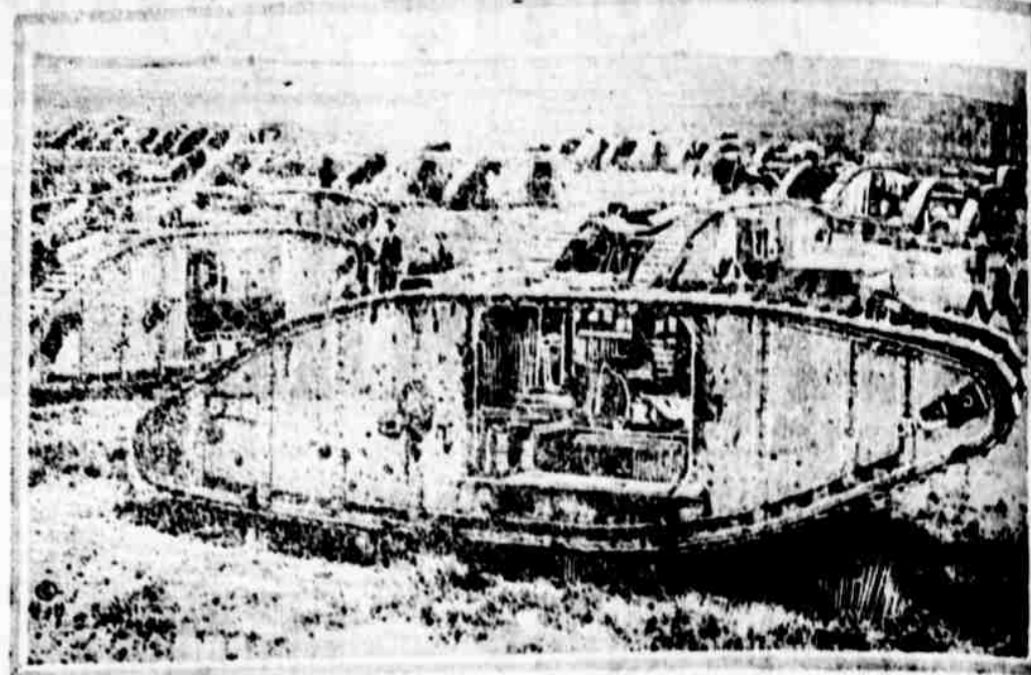
