U. of O. After Officers Reserve Training Camp

EUGENE, April 8.—The University of Oregon may have both a reserve officers' training camp and a cadet corps under a new system now being considered by the war department, according to President P. L. Campbell.

The president declared that the university can have an R. O. T. C. installed here whenever it makes a request for it. Present conditions surrounding the granting of R. O. T. C. standing are not satisfactory or calculated to make the military training now given at the university more efficient, he declared.

Under the present law only United States army officers who have been five years in the service are eligible to take charge of the training. This bars all but retired veterans, whose knowledge of modern military conditions necessarily is limited. The bill introduced in the senate by Senator Chamberlain provides that officers of

one year's experience in the army shall be eligible to take charge of military work in colleges and universities. This would make it possible for a man trained in the modern war camps, probably a graduate of the University of Oregon, to come here and handle the work.

The plan of the student cadet corps as outlined by President Campbell is to have the membership of these corps limited to men below 21 years of age. They would enlist in the service, but would continue their college work until of age when they could, at the discretion of the military authorities, receive a furlough to enable them to complete college work and fit themselves for positions as officers or special workers in the army whenever their services were called.

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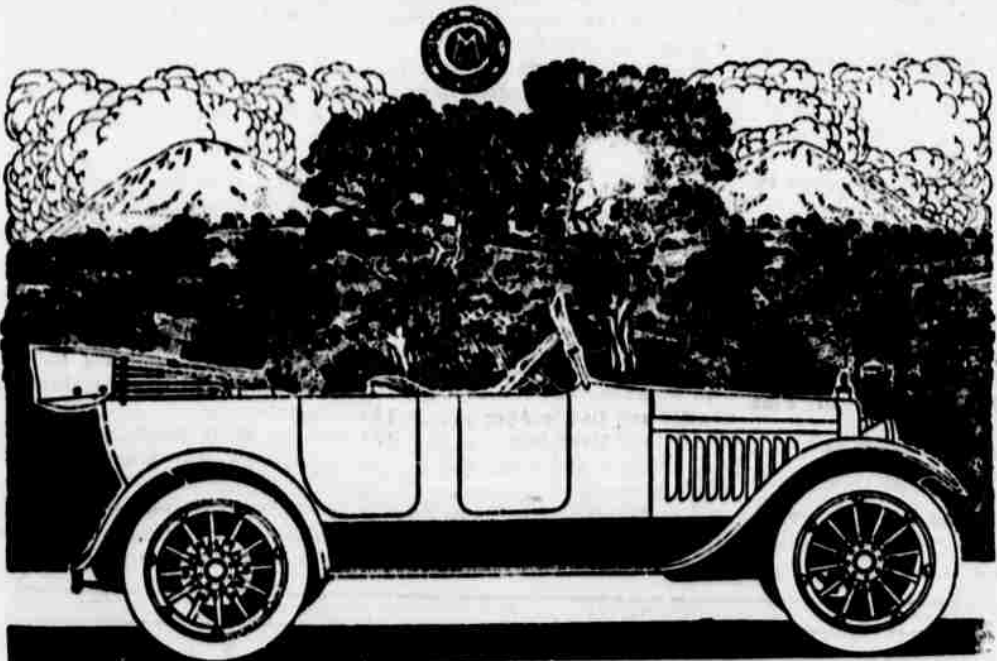
