going to march thru Germany, and they want to know its language. They are studying as they never have before, and they are a little bit afraid that the people at home aren't studying as they ought. They are afraid that between the people at home and the boys, when they come back, there will be a growing gulf.

In regard to the moral life, the Bishop said: In their personal lives the boys at the camp are putting the men of Klamath Falls to shame.

"Religiously, the boys have gone thru a sort of a conversion," he said. "They have consecrated their lives to their country and to humanity, and they have been doing a lot of thinking. They consider it in a sensible manner, as I don't believe that there is a coward in the lot. They are using their little khaki bound New Testament as guide books to that country 'over there,' and are studying how to get there, and what they will do when they get there. Every night, just before or after lights are out, the boys can be seen, down on their knees, in the barracks, and no one throws shoes at them or laughs at them.

"The boys have asked me to say that it is pretty hard work, and they are a long way from the top, but they sort of wished you would join them and climb up with them, as they don't want to go alone." At this juncture the entire audience knelt in prayer, and a short prayer was said for "the boys."

FORMER RESIDENT OF KLAMATH FALLS SHOWS HIS ATTITUDE TOWARD STARS AND STRIPES BY THRASHING NINE MUNS

Many Klamath Falls people will remember Joe Rickert, who for quite a while held down the linotype machine on the old Chronicle. Those who know him best will not be surprised to hear of a recent exploit. It seems that Joe dropped into a cafe in Oakland a short time ago which is much frequented by Germans with Kaiseristic tendencies, and at that particular time a party of nine were toasting the swastika monarch who claims a partnership with God.

Not counting the odds, Joe piled into the bunch, and while he was considerably dilapidated at the cessation of hostilities, those of the pro-German party who were not taken to the hospital were taken to jail. In court last week each was fined \$250 and given a jail sentence.

their neighbors as slackers. The publication of these lists is compulsory, and is not left to the discretion of the Liberty Loan committee. The government realizes that public sentiment and publicity is the strongest weapon available for compelling those who would shirk their duty to get in line, and with the number of patriotic citizens in Klamath County who have made good by responding with 100 per cent, and in many cases two and three times this amount, the county will not be a pleasant place for those who have failed in the nation's crisis which we are now facing. Sentiment will be so strong that these people will be compelled to get on the right side. Today, more than ever before, the people of this country have awakened to the fact that those who are not with us are against us, and after the campaign closes the patriot and the shirker will be known.
