GRAIN ESTIMATES HIGHER

PORTLAND, April 10.—The condition of winter wheat in Oregon is 97 per cent normal; barley is 100 per cent normal. It has been announced that the estimated winter wheat crop will be 13,600,000 bushels. The production of rye is estimated at 615,000 bushels. Both estimates are much above those of last year.

New Postal Rules For Soldiers Magazines

According to a new ruling unwrapped and unaddressed copies of magazines intended for soldiers and sailors, when mailed by other than the publishers, are subject to the postage rate of one cent a copy, regardless of weight. Magazines to be accepted at this rate must have printed in the upper right hand corner of the front cover the following:

"Notice to reader—When you finish reading this magazine, place a one-cent stamp on this notice, mail the magazine, and it will be placed in the hands of soldiers or sailors, destined to proceed over seas. No address; no wrapping."

GEORGE CREEL IS CRITICISED BY CONGRESS

RESIGNATION OF CHAIRMAN OF PUBLIC INFORMATION DEMANDED FOR PACIFIST MARKS DEMANDED BY LONGWORTH

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—George Creel, chairman of the committee on public information, was attacked in both houses of congress for his speech yesterday, when he was quoted as saying that he was glad the country was unprepared for war.

Representative Longworth demanded Creel's immediate resignation. He said that no flagrant pacifist ever went half so far. "It is the first time I have ever heard of an American glorying in unpreparedness," he said.
