Under the new system there are apparently many advantages, which will favorable vote.

A report is now current, however coming from some who have given the matter considerable attention, that the contract now assumed, does not include the power sites, which have been previously held by the Water Users Association, but that these are now retained by the government.

Whether this matter was brought up to the voters of the district by those who canvassed the territory in favor of the new system is not known. but it would appear that the loss to the water users of the project is substantial.

A considerable controversy arose here last year when the United States reclamation service authorized a con-! tract with the California-Oregon Power company to construct a power plant and dam at the head of Link River, with power privileges for fifty years, and the exclusive right to the use of; the Keno canal for a period of ten

The directors of the Water Users Association passed a resolution empowering the association to retain attorneys and enjoin the power company from this procedure, which was deemed against the best interests of the members. The directors' acts were later approved by a vote of the stock holders of the association, but under the new system, it is believed that the power site question will be a matter ut of the hands of the water users.
