HAMILTON TELLS OF CAMP LIFE

FORMER PHYSICIAN FROM HERE TELLS OF MANY NEW DUTIES AT CAMP—SAYS THEY ARE TREATED SAME AS A BUNCH OF RECRUITS

A letter has been received from Captain R. R. Hamilton, who is training with 1,200 doctors at Fort Riley, Kans. The letter from Captain Hamilton, in part, is as follows:

"There are about 1,200 doctors in training here. We will be here three months, and then we will be assigned to some outfit. There is some talk of transferring the officer's training school to Oglethorpe, Ga., next month, as they are going to make this into a cavalry station.

"We have to drill, ride horses and learn how to care for a horse, take ten and twenty mile hikes, attend lectures on medical surgery, sanitation, hygiene, equitation, army medicine, emergency dressings, etc. Every minute is taken up, and when night comes we are ready to drop into our beds.

"Some of the men are too old to stand the gaff, and are sent home. Only the physically fit are sent overseas. Some men develop weak hearts and some give out under the nervous strain. I have a decided advantage on the military staff, on account of my Philippine experience.

"Most of the men are first lieutenants. The captains and majors are chosen from the ones who show the best results. I see right now that I will have to work every minute, if I expect to get ahead.

"We are treated in our military work just the same as a bunch of recruits would be when they first begin to drill. The drill masters land all over us, and they do not say, doctor, captain or lieutenant when addressing us, but: 'Jones, what's the matter with you? can't you lift your feet?' or 'Smith, get back where you belong. You're the worst rookie I ever saw.'

"Believe me, it is straight business, and right from the shoulder.

"Taps is sounding, and I must close and put out the light. We go to bed at 10 o'clock.

"I think I can come home on a furlough after my training is finished."

First Photo of Americans Wounded in the War

Some of these Americans were wounded in the fight at Cambria. Censors have not permitted the battles in which others were wounded to be named. But the wounds were not so severe, despite the loss of legs, that the spirits of the Americans have been dampened. The lower picture shows two of the wounded men leaving a Paris hospital. J. C. Geiger's left leg was shattered by a German bullet at Cambria. Darland was wounded and captured by Germans at Cambria, but he was later rescued by the British.
