O. Reef has bought the Hanson ranch, a quarter of a mile north of Keno. Mr. Reef took possession, and is now putting in a crop of grain.

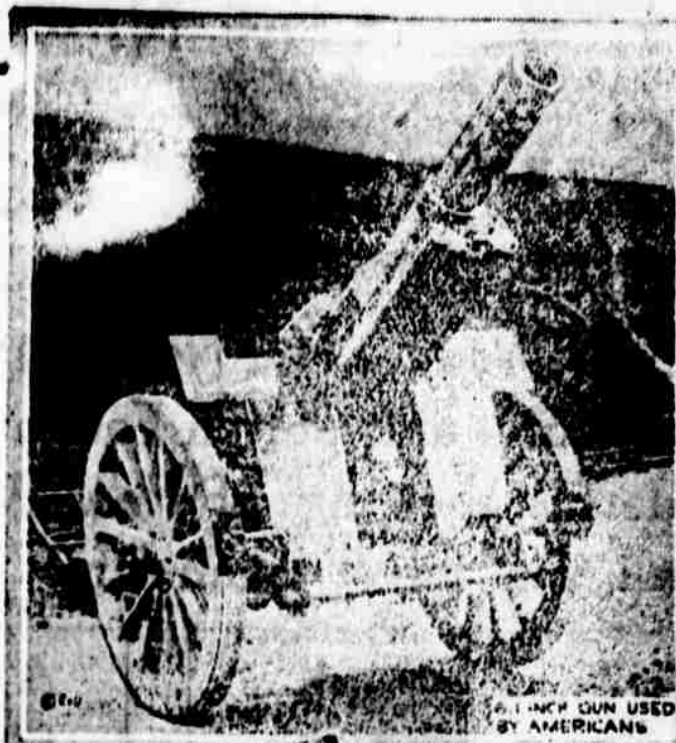
FORBES WILL NOT BE CANDIDATE THIS YEAR

First Photo of Gun the Americans Used on the Germans, and the First Photo of the Newest and Greatest French Gun



NEW FRENCH GUN 15.75 INCHES

These are two of the guns pounding away at the Germans in the great battle now raging in France. The upper photo shows a new gun of 6.10 inches recently made by the French and turned over to the Americans for use on their sector. For the Americans have no guns of their own as yet. The lower picture shows the newest weapon of the French, a mighty gun of 15.75 inches just turned out by them in time to help stop the great German assault. It is so heavy that it must

be fired from a railway track and a car especially constructed for it. This is the heaviest gun the French, whose artillery is famous, have built. The recoil from the larger gun is so great that it can only be fired when the weapon points the same way as the railway track. The car carrying it is thus permitted to shoot back from the tremendous "kick." Fired from a position across the track it would tear out the rails and throw gun and car into the ditch.

Germans Retract Peace Resolutions

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 17.—The German government has definitely annulled the peace resolution "without annexations or indemnities," passed by the majority of the Reichstag last July, according to an official dispatch today from France. The pan-Germanist organ, Tagliche Rundschau, is quoted as follows:

"Count Hertling informed the leaders of the majority parties that if they adhered to their resolution he would resign. Factions of the majority then adopted the chancellor's point of view, and formally declared that they accepted the new program of the imperial government, which includes the incorporation by Germany of French territory, and of the Belgian coast of Flanders, as well as the payment to

Germany by the western powers of a considerable war indemnity."

Continuing, the dispatch says: "Count Hertling appears to have broken with Ertzberger and refused to receive him. All these details have been confirmed by the centrist deputy, Trimborn, at a secret congress of the Rhenish Catholic party, held at Cologne on the 2d of April. The majority socialists also accepted the annexationist program of the government."

WOMEN ALIENS WATCHED

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 17.—The government agents are watching over a hundred German and Austrian women. They will arrest or intern them when the president signs a bill, making them enemy aliens.
