Logging Railroad At Chiloquin Soon Ready

In about three weeks it is expected that two and a half miles of new railroad at the Madox Lumber company plant will be ready for use. The new road will be a continuation of the Southern Pacific spur, and will extend across the new bridge over the Williamson River into the woods.

Jack Goldwaite, president of the company, who has just returned from San Francisco, says that the cars and locomotives are on the way here. The company expects to have 24 or 25 logging trucks, and to get out between 100,000 and 125,000 feet of lumber a day.

The new bridge, which is almost completed, has been under the superintendency of R. E. Hutchinson. It is for the purpose of getting the locomotive across the river, and will be bigger and better than the one at Chiloquin. It will be a public bridge, and will have a capacity of forty tons.

Water Users Have All Former Rights

The board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation District met on Monday last in their usual place of business, and canvassed the returns of the election held in the district on the preceding Saturday. The statement of the general result follows:

Total vote cast 76. For contract with U. S., 72; against said contract, 4.

The board of directors are extremely anxious that there exist no misunderstanding in regard to the result of this vote. It was explicitly explained at the several meetings held at different points within the district prior to the date of said election that the adoption of this contract does not in the least have any bearing upon the status of the Water Users Association; nor does it change in the least any contract which the said association now has with the government, or in any way change any contract which the individual water user has with the government. The amount stated in the new contract and which amount was ratified by the vote of Saturday, was arrived at by adding together the amount of money each individual user in the district had formerly agreed to pay, which amount is based upon existing laws and the several individual contracts. You will not pay one cent more under this contract than you would pay, had it not been adopted, that is, so far as the government is concerned. The Water Users Association and its contract with the government at this time are not changed in the least.

That this new contract may be fully consummated it will be necessary for the Water Users Association as a corporation to adopt the identical contract in their annual meeting next June 1st. Whether or not that will be done is yet a thing of the future, and it is usually not good policy to cross bridges until they are reached. However, there seems to be some apprehension on the part of some that in some dark and murky manner, the water users have certain rights that are not embraced within this new contract. While every man has the right to his opinion, it behooves such to know that facts will support that opinion. It is believed that any claim that the water users are losing something by this contract cannot square with the facts in this case. It can be ascertained without any doubt or peradventure that this new contract embraces every legal right that the water users ever had under the existing contracts and reclamation laws. Everything that was possible under the water users plan is possible under the new contract, the reclamation laws are the same since the new contract was adopted as before, and you must base every right that you claim upon the reclamation law.

In conclusion, let me again assure you that no legal right has been abandoned in the adoption of this new contract, and that you bear the same relation to the Secretary of the Interior and the reclamation laws, whether you operate under the water users plan of organization or under the district plan. Our legal relationship has not been changed in the least. Just what the water users could legally expect under one plan can be expected and demanded under the other plan.

That the form of organization does not change our relationship with the Secretary of the Interior and the reclamation laws will be fully discussed and laid before all the water users before the next annual meeting. Before forming any fixed opinion, read carefully your existing contracts, understand your relationships to the Secretary of the Interior; read the reclamation act of June 17, 1902, and all acts of congress amending that law, and all acts supplementary thereto; also read your articles of incorporation of the Klamath Water Users Association, and do not overlook the rules and regulations of the Secretary of the Interior, by the articles of incorporation of the Water Users Association, all and every one of these above enumerated acts, documents and things are included and must be considered in forming a conclusion of what you now have and what you may rightfully demand. The board of directors cordially requests every water user to fully inform himself of these matters, and any question that you may have will be given full and careful consideration.
