FOOD CARDS DISTRIBUTED

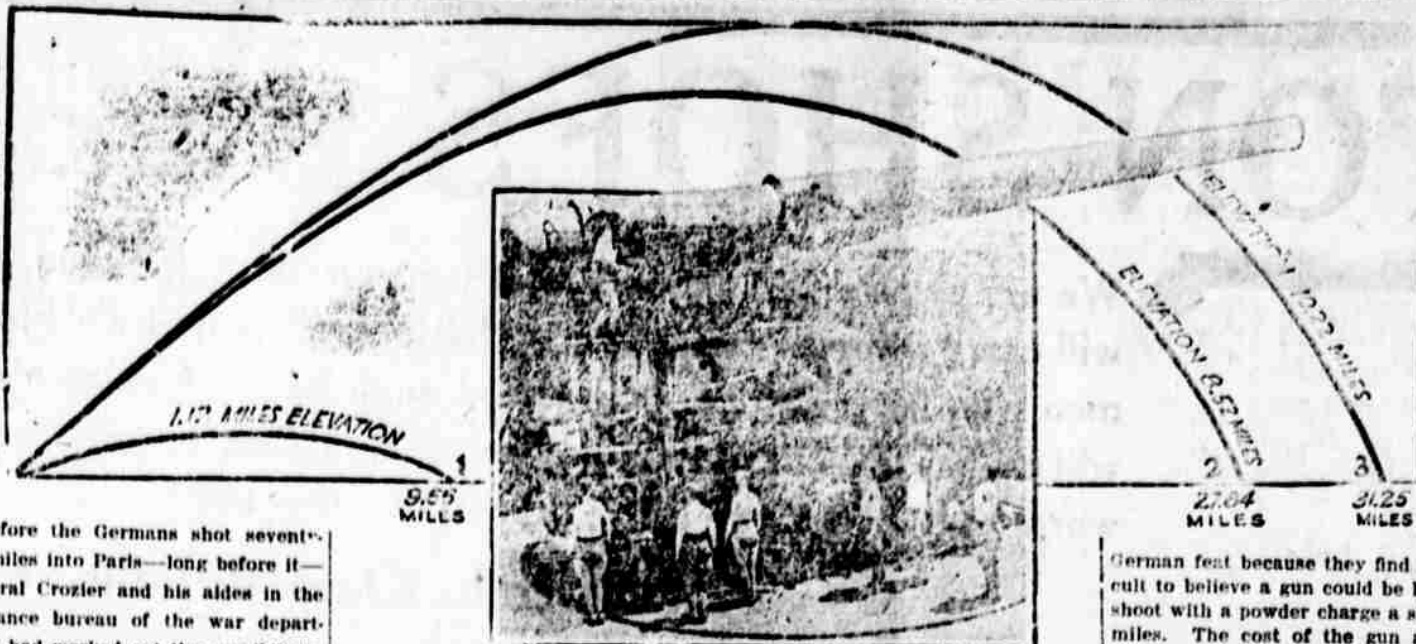

Americans Knew Principle of Long Range Shooting Before Germans



Before the Germans shot seventy-six miles into Paris—long before it—General Crozier and his aides in the ordnance bureau of the war department had worked out the possibilities of long range shooting with coast defense guns of the United States. They found that a 12-inch rifle of 35-calibre, elevated 15 degrees above the horizontal—just as shown in the photograph—would shoot a 1,070 pound shell, which started with a velocity at the muzzle of 2,250 feet per second, 9.66 miles. In its course the shell would describe an arc 1.12 miles high at its apex. A similar gun, but of 40-

calibre, thus carrying a larger amount of explosive, causing a muzzle velocity of 2,500 feet per second, would carry the same shell, if elevated 40 degrees above the horizontal, 27.84 miles. That shell would go 8.52 miles high. But the latter gun at the same elevation and with the same powder charge would shoot a shell weighing only 700 pounds at 3,100 muzzle velocity, 31.25 miles. The shell would describe an arc 10.32 miles high. These facts

were published in the Scientific American in May, 1915, long before the Germans shelled Dunkirk from Newport, 22 miles distant. The public was told this was an extraordinary feat. But American ordnance experts knew it was not. Colonel Ingalls, one of the greatest ordnance experts, before the Germans had figured that a Brown 10-inch gun of large calibre could be made to shoot 49 miles. 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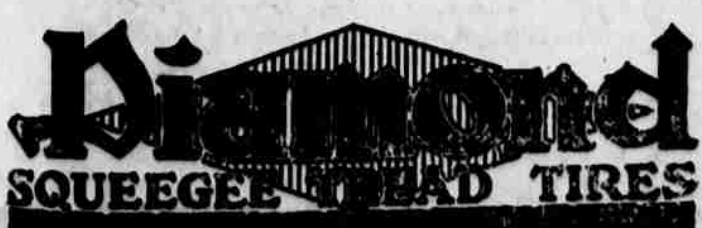
