POTATOES SOLD IN ASHLAND

CARLOAD OF KLAMATH COUNTY MURPHIES DISPOSED OF BY LOCAL SALESMAN—MARKET CONDITIONS GRADUALLY IMPROVE

A carload of Klamath County spuds has been disposed of at Ashland by W. C. Townsend of this city, who has been making an effort for the past few weeks to market the large supply of the commodity now held over by the producers here. The potatoes sold in this instance belonged to Henry Remon and were loaded and shipped by him.

Altho the prospects for disposing of the potatoes here were very dubious a short time ago, there is evidence that the market conditions are changing for the better, and it is believed that the surplus stock here may yet be sold at a reasonable figure.
